POSTPONE VISIT.

Boston Vermonters Are Not Coming Until Fall.

Northfield, July 12.—The Vermont association of Boston has decided to postpone its proposed trip to this state in August, until October that it may visit Montpelier during the legislative session.

Under this new arrangement the association will not be in Northfield at the dedication of the Brown public library next month as had been planned, much to the regret of the people in this vicinity.

One of the things which Robert C. Bacon of Windsor county, the new Republican nominee for state's attorney, will be asked to do will be to look into the question whether anything can be done to prevent the shipment of liquor into Brattleboro through the medium of an express company by persons who are not able to dispose of their wares to Brattleboro customers in any other way. The vote of the town against license is in some measure defeated by this express business, and it is the opinion of prominent lawyers both in Brattleboro and Bellows Falls that the business can be stopped.

MYSTERY CLEARED UP. Body of Boy, Supposed to Have Been Kidnapped, Found.

Guilford, Conn., July 12.—The body of little Clayton Bishop, the six-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bishop, who was supposed to have been kidnapped, was found yesterday wedged in among the timbers of an old wreck in West river, the find being made by Louis Jacobs, a lobsterman.

The boy had been missing since Sunday morning, when he left his home to visit his grandmother, Mrs. Fannie Squires, in a distant part of the town. It is thought that the boy fell into the river from Jones' bridge, a mile above the place where the body was found.

Rewards of \$400 for information that would lead to the recovery of the missing lad, had been offered, as it was thought that he had been stolen.
