ILLNESS WAS FATAL

Lady Curzon Dead in Her English Home. Formerly MARY LEITER. Formerly Mary Leiter—During Term of Husband as Viceroy of India She Was Much in the Public Eye.

London, July 19.—Lady Curzon, the wife of Lord Curzon, formerly viceroy of India, died at 7.40 o'clock last evening. She had been sinking all day, though it had been believed in the morning that she would recover. The death was so unexpected that it startled all London, where she was one of the most popular women in society. She has been suffering for a long time from general debility, and had never recovered from the attack that overcame her in the summer of 1904. She had been in apparently good health until the beginning of the hot season. The weather seemed to have a very bad effect on her. But though she was considered very ill, it was not believed that she was dangerously sick. No later than yesterday morning a bulletin was given out saying that she would likely recover. Consequently no one had looked for such a sudden death.

INDIANA REPUBLICAN ASSAILS STAND-PATTER

A Former State Party Chairman Urges the Need of Tariff Reform to Help People Own Their Homes. Indianapolis, Ind., July 19.—Vigorous denunciation of Representatives Landis and Watson of this state was made Tuesday by former Republican state committee Chairman Herley in an attack on the stand-patters in the party's ranks. He urged the need of tariff revision, "except the pro-majority of the people was in favor of it. Not only did he criticize Landis strongly, but he also criticized Watson of moral cowardice in wishing to take the step Landis took and not daring to do so. "Everybody is in favor of tariff revision," said Herley, "except the protected interests and a few politicians. Watson wanted to make a stand-pat speech in Congress, but he knew he did not dare to do so. The speech which Charles Landis made sounding the stand-pat slogan will cost him thousands of votes. There is only one side to the tariff question. When steel rails sell for \$88 a ton in the United States and \$18 a ton in Canada, it is time something was done. If there is any doubtful person let him study the tariff on lumber and building materials generally. The time has actually come when a poor man cannot build a home for himself because he cannot pay for the materials that enter into its construction."

NEW HOLY ALLIANCE.

Germany and Austria Hungary to Help Clear Hold Poland. Paris, July 19.—The Journal yesterday says it is in a position to affirm that in the course of the recent interview at Schoenbrunn palace, near Vienna, between the emperor of Austria-Hungary and the German emperor, their main deliberation on the means to adopt in case of the outbreak of the revolution in Russia. Emperor Nicholas was advised of the general nature of the deliberations. It was decided in principle, the paper adds, that Germany and Austria will intervene in Poland, English politicians this morning, the Russian emperor finds it impossible to maintain the control of Poland, and the three emperors thereafter acting in concert for the maintenance of the status quo of their respective possessions. The Journal further asserts that this understanding amounts to a regular holy alliance between the three emperors.

KING NOT TO VISIT CANADA.

His Sovereign Duties Keep Him in England. Ottawa, Ont., July 19.—King Edward VII will not visit Canada. An address inviting the King and Queen to come to their American colony was adopted by both houses of Parliament last May. Lord Grey, governor general of the Dominion, has received from London, eight days ago, a reply in which it is said that the absence of the sovereign from Great Britain for any length of time would be impossible, owing to the responsibilities of the empire devolving upon him. It would be difficult also for the King to decline to do the same to another. The cablegram concludes as follows: "I am to say that the king feels unable at present to entertain the idea of a journey to Canada, which is not due to lack of appreciation of the loyalty and devotion of the people of the Dominion."

New York Father Assailed in Presence of Youth's Finance. New York, July 19.—During a quarrel between Conrad Schirmer and his 19-year-old son, Conrad, Jr., at the home of the son's sweetheart, Miss Clara Lazarus, in East One Hundred and Fourth street, early yesterday, the youth stabbed his father with a piece of broken glass, inflicting probably a mortal wound. The elder Schirmer consented that the boy should marry the girl when he was 21, but declared that Conrad must stop staying out so late nights while calling upon his sweetheart. The boy disobeyed, and Tuesday night remained very late. His father went there and attempted to chastise him in the presence of the young woman. The son resisted, and in the struggle the father broke the glass pane of a door. Conrad seized a piece of broken glass and plunged it into his father's side. He was arrested.

Found by Workmen Near Manchester

DUG OUT OF THE SAND. Foul Play Suspected and Manchester Authorities Investigating—Body Decomposed—Was About Six Miles Below the City.

Manchester, N. H., July 19.—The police were notified by telephone yesterday morning that the construction gang on the new Goffs' Falls, Litchfield & Hudson street railway has just discovered the body of a woman hidden near the Nashua road about seven miles below this city. Foul play was suspected and Medical Examiner G. M. Davis and Police Inspector Clifton B. Hildreth at once left for the scene by automobile to commence an investigation. It was stated that the body was badly decomposed, but no further details were given. The scene of the supposed murder is within the long arm of Manchester territory stretching down the river for three miles below Goffs' Falls village. It is near the James Cheney place, which adjoins the Litchfield line. The officers in their investigation found the body to be that of a young woman of medium height, with hair of reddish color, the soles of a pair of shoes, together with two steel buckles. By means of these buckles the officers hope to identify the victim, of what is believed by them to have been a murder. The body was unearthed in sandy soil, one hundred yards distant from the highway and from the barrenness and unproductive nature of the soil, laid fair to be undisturbed for an indefinite time.

CONDENNS ZULU SLAUGHTER.

British Premier Deplores the Killing of the Rebel Wounded. London, July 19.—Under Colonial Secretary Churchill gave to the House of Commons yesterday afternoon the official reply to the government's inquiries into the alleged atrocities perpetrated on wounded Zulus in Natal during the operations against the rebel chief, Bambata. According to a telegram from the governor of Natal 3,500 natives had been killed and 2,000 made prisoners, including the wounded. The Natal government had no information about wounded natives being killed by the native forces, though it was possible that such acts might have happened. In reply to further questions asking what steps the government proposed to take in view of the practical admission that wounded Zulus had been killed, Premier Campbell-Bannerman said there was no disposition either to excuse or acquit such practices. The Natal government had no knowledge of the killing of wounded natives and had been greatly surprised by the extraordinary telegrams sent out from Johannesburg.

STRIKE IN SEVASTOPOL.

Coincident With Opening of Trial of Mutineers. St. Petersburg, July 19.—A court-martial under the presidency of Gen. Andreeff opened at Sevastopol yesterday for the trial of ninety-six sailors who were concerned in the mutiny of last November, when the sailors of the Black sea fleet and the men of the Brest regiment revolted and Rear-Admiral Pissarevski was shot in trying to disperse a meeting. The employees of the Admiralty went on strike today as an expression of sympathy with the accused men and the commercial clerks joined them. Street traffic is suspended. Vice Admiral Skrydloff will succeed the late Vice Admiral Chukhin in command of the Black sea fleet. The plundering of estates in the south by the peasantry is spreading rapidly and landowners are fleeing. A bomb was thrown Tuesday from a window of the Georgian Nobles' School near the palace gardens, and Col. Maximoff, the chief of police, was seriously wounded.

TO HELP RUSSIA.

Germany and Austria Agreed on Plan of Action in Poland. OUR CANNED GOODS SOUND.

The London Experts Find No Dirt, No Preservatives. London, July 18.—Since the canned meat scare a widespread analyzing of samples of canned goods of every description has been going on at the request of the local government board. With a few exceptions, the analysts' reports indicate that about the only thing which can be alleged against the canned foods sent to England is that the retailers keep them on their shelves too long. Apparently nothing has been discovered to bear out the recent scare, so far as imported goods are concerned. For instance, an analyst's report on fourteen samples of American goods purchased in the poorest parts of Wandsworth says "In every sample the contents of the can were sound and in no case were preservatives or other coloring matter detected. Evidence of dirt or other extraneous matter was carefully looked for, but in every instance the samples, in this respect, were satisfactory."
