Clash Between Strikers and Troops

THE DANGER IS GROWING

Extent of Strike Movement Cannot Be Determined Before Monday

St. Petersburg, Aug. 4.—The situation is growing more threatening hourly as the strike grows, and danger of violence is increasing. Most of the shops in the city are closed. One clash between the police and strikers occurred this morning at one of the railway stations, in which eight policemen were killed.

IN DARKNESS FOR A TIME.

Employees of Electric Lighting Plants Went Out.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 4.—St. Petersburg was in darkness for a time last night. The employees of the electric lighting plants ceased work in obedience to the call for a general strike.

Matineers Steer for Reval.

Helsingfors, Aug. 4.—An incipient mutiny broke out yesterday on board the Russian cruiser Bogatyr. It was immediately put down by arrest of two hundred of the sailors on board.

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WAS DUE TO TREACHERY
