SHUT OUT BY CHICAGO.

Chicago Nationals Win Another.

Boston, Aug. 16.—The Boston Americans signaled their return home yesterday afternoon by receiving a bad wallop, at the hands of the league leaders, by the score of 6 to 0, while a great crowd of loyal supporters looked on.

Tannehill, who pitched most of the game for the home team, was given miserable support, Boston making a total of five errors. Glaze went into the box during the eighth inning and was hit for a single during the last two innings.

The home team was powerless before Walsh. Errors threw away the game in the first inning. Tannehill hit Hahn, Jones struck out and Isbell singled, sending Hahn to third. Davis fled out to Stahl and Hahn scored.

Donohue pounded a swift one to Tannehill and was safe. Peterson dropped Morgan's throw home on a double steal and Donohue went away round to third, while Isbell scored. Dougherty struck out.

From that point Tannehill pitched fine ball up to the seventh inning. The visitors scored one in the sixth on a fielder's choice to Isbell and Hoy's error on Donohue's single, the fielder allowing the ball to get away from him.

Chicago bunched four hits of Tannehill in the seventh, scoring three runs aided by an error by Morgan. Sullivan started with a single and Tannehill beat out a bunt. Walsh hit to Gimshaw, who threw to Morgan on third, but the latter missed the throw and two runs went in.

Hahn's single scored Walsh. Jones followed with a single, but was forced. Ferris and Morgan disposed of the next two men.

The nearest Boston came to tallying was in the fourth inning. Parent got a pass and got to third aided by Hoy's safe bunt. When Walsh made a wild pitch Parent attempted to score, but died in the attempt.

GRAND ARMY GAINED 3,500

Members During the Year Just Closed

IS THE STATEMENT MADE

Commander Tanner Reports Organization Stronger, in Encampment Address—Tender Tribute to Wife.

Minneapolis, Minn., Aug. 16.—In opening his annual address to the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, Corporal James Tanner, commander-in-chief, today made the somewhat surprising statement that despite the ironies made by death, the Grand Army had actually increased in membership in the past year.

"I had considered it almost inevitable," he said, "that on this occasion I would be compelled to report to you a very considerable net loss in membership on the contrary I am happy to tell you that, by reason of the zealous interest taken in our order by many comrades, we have been able to more than offset the losses incurred through death, and that our order stands today 3,500 stronger in numbers than it did at Denver last September."

Not a Veteran Dishonored. Repeatedly during the past years, on various public occasions, I have definitely and perhaps arrogantly, called attention to the fact that while the public conscience has been shocked and outraged by the exposure of moral turpitude on the part of many of those who stood among the so-called most eminent men of the nation, eminent in financial and religious circles, trusted guardians of the interests of widows and orphans, for whom they had made careful safeguards to cover the necessities for comfort through all their natural life, men who in church circles stood on the very steps of the altar, trusted upholders of the cause of Christ, yet who when their real characters were exposed were exhibited in such poverty of soul and honor as compared to them, Lazarus in his lowest state might justly be considered a multi-millionaire.

FIND BAG OF GEMS

A Laborer Discovers Jewels Worth \$50,000

THEREBY GAINS REWARD

Elephant Plays Detective—Squeezes the Life Nearly Out of a Hindoo Servant, Who Then Confesses to the Big Theft.

St. Louis, Aug. 16.—Acting under instructions cabled from England, John P. O'Brien, a laborer employed in the wrecking of the World's Fair Buildings, has unearthed an alligator bag containing jewels valued at \$50,000 which were stolen from Mr. and Mrs. P. Henry Clayton of Devonshire, England, during a visit to the Louisiana Purchase Exposition two years ago.

The jewels were stolen from a trunk and they were not missed until the Clayton family returned to England after a tour around the world. They then had no means of knowing where the jewels had been stolen. About a month ago a Hindoo servant, who had been in their employ during their trip, was fatally injured by an elephant in India and as his deathbed confession that he stole the jewels while in St. Louis.

He said that he became alarmed, and, fearing detection, had dropped them into a hole in the wall of the Manufacturers' Building. Later he again wished to secure the gems, but, on returning to the place he had secreted them, could not reach the bottom of the space between the plaster and the side of the building. Fearing to make any inquiries or ask assistance, the Hindoo departed from St. Louis with the Claytons, leaving the jewels in their hiding place.

O'Brien was generously rewarded, and was also employed by Mr. Clayton as his personal attendant.
