Boston, Aug. 17.—The home team was rarely in the game with Chicago yesterday, and at the end was lucky to have piled up four runs, while the visitors had scored nine. Three of Boston's scores were due to a wild throw by Tannehill. Joe Harris was hit hard all through the game, Sullivan particularly distinguishing himself with a single, a triple and a homer. Patterson started to pitch for Chicago, but retired in favor of Altrock in the second inning.

Hahn started the tattoo with a triple to the left field bleachers and Jones singled over second, sending Hahn in. Then Grimshaw dropped Peterson's assist on Isbell and Davis went out on a sacrifice. BRING STANDARD OIL BEFORE GRAND JURY

Federal Officials Have Case Prepared to the Last Detail, It is Said.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 17.—Federal officials believe that they will be able to start on the investigation of the relation of certain railroads with the Standard Oil company before the new grand jury today.

The law requires a minimum of 16 grand jurors to make up a legal panel. The government attorneys prefer to have a full panel, but it was stated by a high official Wednesday that the investigation would proceed if the 16 could be secured.
