NEGRO DEFIES JIM CROW LAW.

W. H. Ellis Refuses to Be Ousted from Pullman Car in Trip Through Texas.

Austin, Tex., Aug. 23.—W. H. Ellis, the negro colonization promoter and capitalist of New York, who became noted for his association with King Menelik of Abyssinia, occupied a Pullman Tuesday in his trip through Texas on his way to New York, from Mexico, in defiance of the law of this state. Efforts were made to have him removed from the Pullman at several places en route by the railroad and train authorities, but he refused to obey all orders to go into the negro compartment of the day coach. The railroads on which he traveled are liable to heavy penalties for violation of the separate coach law.

CRIME LITTLE CHECKED

Russian Police Seem Nearly Powerless.

ARREST ONE OUT OF 25

Assassins Make Their Escape from Siberia—Relief for Jews; Lines of Strategic Railways Announced.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 23.—In spite of the wholesale arrests and deportation of revolutionists, the big centres' daily chronicle of murder and robbery is not appreciably diminishing. The police seem to be utterly powerless to capture the perpetrators of the crimes. They do not make an arrest in one case out of twenty-five. While the revolutionary opposition to the Government has thus degenerated into a campaign of crime, the three political parties, the constitutional Democrats, Socialists and revolutionists, are all fighting. The efforts to effect an amalgamation have failed and all the leaders seem to be greatly at sea as to what tactics to pursue.

The Reel, which reappeared yesterday, makes an attempt to analyze the situation, but evidently it does not know which way to turn. Menikoff, who was associated with the famous Russian revolutionary agitator, Geyshulin, in the conspiracy which was responsible for the assassination of former Minister of Public Instruction Bogolepoff, and former Minister of the Interior Sipagin, in company with Sassoport, the assassin of former Minister of the Interior You Plekve, and several other terrorists, has escaped from Acanti, trans-Baikalia. This party was the last batch of prisoners taken from the Schusenburk fortress.

It is announced that some amelioration of the condition of the Jews will be made without awaiting the action of Parliament. A commission is now sitting at the ministry of the interior elaborating a general project of law, whose provisions, however, will only include an extension of the limits of the pale of residence and extension of the rights of education.

OUTLAWS MENACE SMYRNA.

Foreign Residents Are Compelled to Move in Suburbs.

Washington, Aug. 23.—Brigandage is so common near Smyrna, Syria, that Americans have appealed repeatedly to the American consulate there for protection against brigands in the fertile root fields and tobacco plantations, and the foreign population is moving into the city from the suburbs.

The unsatisfactory conditions in Smyrna are detailed in a dispatch to the state department from Ernest A. Magillio, American vice consul. Within a few months practically all the wealthy Ottomans have moved out of the suburbs, and the English consul has posted a notice that British subjects who go into the interior do so at their peril.

Americans have been advised that travel in the interior is unsafe.

MORE DEAD IN RUSSIA.

Agrarian Situation More Acute Around Samara.

Samara, Russia, Aug. 23.—The agrarian situation in this province is grave. Disorders are prevalent in numerous districts and troops have been requisitioned to restore order in three localities, where firing is going on. Many men have been killed.

The peasants of the Kosloff estate, who recently seized and occupied the land, have returned the property to its owners.

A strike of factory hands has begun in Samara and many agitators have been arrested.

THREAT OF MUTINY.

Russian Soldiers in the Far East Angered by Duma's Dissolution.

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 23.—Advices received by the steamship Empress of China, which arrived here Tuesday from the Orient, say that the news of the dissolution of the Duma had created great excitement in Vladivostok and Siberia. The officials are, it is said, doing everything possible to prevent the dissolution becoming known.
