The Messenger's admonitions for months past should have taught the necessity for a pure milk supply and at the same time should have built up a favorable public sentiment.

EXCURSION TO NEW YORK

By Way of Central Vermont Railway and Norwich Line Steamer. The annual fall excursion to New York over the Central Vermont Railway will be run on Tuesday, Sept. 25 by special train to New London, thence by steamer "City of Lowell" to New York. The fare for the round trip from Williamstown, Barre, Montpelier and all points on the Central between St. Albans and White River Junction will be only \$6.00. A special train of first-class coast-line coaches will run daily to New London, leaving Barre at 11:35 a. m., Montpelier at 12:20, Waterbury at 1:05, Woodsville at 1:55, Northfield at 2:40. Tickets will be good going only on the special train and branch trains connecting with special September 25 to arrive in New York morning of September 26. Good returning to leave New York any day until October 31, 1906, inclusive, and on regular trains on above dates, which by the time card are scheduled to stop at stations named. No stop-over privileges allowed.
