SALE OF CIGARETTES TO MINORS.

In referring recently to the sale of cigarettes to minors in Barre, it was stated by this paper that the law forbade such sale to minors under the age of sixteen years. There was an error in giving the age limit. Prior to the year 1900 the limit was sixteen years; at that time it was changed to twenty-one. Now it constitutes a misdemeanor to sell or to give away cigarettes to persons under the age of 21. To avoid confusion the section referred to is here printed: "A person who sells or gives away or furnishes to any person under 21 years of age cigarettes, cigarette paper or cigarette wrapper shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not more than fifty dollars or imprisonment in the house of correction not more than two months, or shall suffer both penalties at the discretion of the court, for each offense." The law took effect on January 1, 1901.
