TORTURED WIVES TO DEATH.

Horrible Stories of the King of Annam's Cruelties Reach Paris.

Paris, Oct. 6.—Thanh Thai, King of Annam, Indo-China, has again been guilty of such atrocities that the French government may be compelled to adopt rigorous measures, as it did several years ago, when, on account of the scandal caused by the barbarous torture of the king's personal attendants, the French president, at the head of the government, entered the palace to save the lives of the remaining attendants.

THE YANKS BEAT BOSTONS

Chicago Champions Got Away With Cleveland's Yesterday—Boston Nationals Put It Over the Giants Also.

Boston, Oct. 6.—The Boston Americans returned home for the next to the last game of the season with New York yesterday and were defeated 6 to 4 through the bunching of hits off Oberlin in the fourth and seventh innings.

Morgan scored the first run of the game in the second inning on his triple and an out. Oberlin did all right until the fourth, when the Yanks got after him. Connor started with a scratch hit past Wagner and Keeler sent him along with a sacrifice. Eberfeld's single brought Connor in. Chase singled and then he and Eberfeld worked a double steal.

Neither team scored again until the seventh, when the visitors laid the game away. A fielder's choice, a pass, an out and a single by Chase, his third of the game, brought in two tallies.

SHAW TO GO BY MARCH 4

After That Time Not to Be In Cabinet

WATCHES RE-IMPORTED

As a Tariff Lesson—The Fishery Dispute Has Been Settled—Can't Give Liquor With Suits.

Washington, Oct. 6.—A despatch from Columbus, O., quotes Secretary Shaw as saying: "After March 4 I do not expect to be in the President's Cabinet."

A Lesson from the Tariff.

A big box of re-imported American watches reached Democratic congressional headquarters here Thursday. They were made at the Elgin works in Illinois sold abroad and then purchased by a New Yorker, who sells them to the committee for \$7.98. The identical kind of watch, Elgin movement, with 20-year gold lined case, is sold in this country by the combination of watch factories at \$19.38.

Enforcing the Eight-Hour Law.

The Department of Justice has taken measures to enforce the eight-hour law and instructions have been sent to special agents of the department in various parts of the country to investigate the question as to whether there have been any violations of that law on the part of contractors engaged in public works.

Can't Give Liquor With Suits.

Commissioner of Internal Revenue Vokes has curbed an enterprising tailor of New York, who encourages custom by giving prizes of "six varieties of assorted liquors" with each suit of clothes, shipping the garments and the liquors by express. The Government looks upon that as a retail liquor business, and the tailor cannot proceed without taking out a revenue license.

TO ATTACK STANDARD OIL.

Cabinet Conference on Prosecution Awaits Return of Taft.

Washington, Oct. 6.—As soon as an important conference will be held by the President, Secretary Root, Attorney General Moody, and Mr. Taft to decide on plans for the attack on the Standard Oil Company under the Sherman law. The plan prepared by Assistant Attorney General Purdy, Frank B. Kellogg of St. Paul, and Charles B. Morrison of Chicago, has been submitted to Mr. Moody and the President. The President, however, wanted to advise with Taft before taking final action, hence the latter's return will be awaited.

A CUBAN GENERAL ONE DAY.

Kansas Veteran Asked to Resign Day After His Appointment.

Wichita, Kan., Oct. 6.—C. A. Mosher of Wichita received a commission as a general in the Cuban army on Wednesday and the next day was asked to resign. He wrote President Palma offering to raise a regiment of rough riders similar to the one led by Theodore Roosevelt in 1898, and Mr. Palma at once sent him a commission as a general, dating it back three months. When Secretary Taft arrived in Havana, however, Mosher was asked to resign. In the same letter was a draft for his salary as a Cuban general since the date of his commission.

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\$10,000 FOR A BOOK.

Shakespeare's "Passionate Pilgrim" of 1612.

London, Oct. 6.—It was thought Wednesday that the purchaser of the 1612 edition of Shakespeare's "Passionate Pilgrim," for which the enormous price of \$10,000 was paid, was an American. It was, however, bought by an Englishman.
