Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges.

It is expected that Senator William P. Dillingham, of Montpelier, will be a guest of the White Mountain Traveler's Association at its eighteenth annual banquet to be held at the Eagle Hotel in Concord, N. H., Friday evening, October 26.

Dr. J. B. Wheeler and his daughters, Miss Mary and Miss Constance Wheeler, of Burlington, returned home Monday night from their European trip. The Misses Wheeler left for Europe last November and Doctor Wheeler left to join them, July 19 last.

Brig. Gen. Stephen P. Jocelyn, U. S. N., has been directed to assume command of the department of the Columbia with headquarters at Portland, Ore., and has taken up his new assignment. He has only a few more months to remain in the service before retirement under the law.

E. D. Ramsay, of Vergennes, has in his possession a gold dollar coined at the Charlotte N. C. mint in 1854. The United States mint records state that only four were coined and a single specimen is now easily worth \$100. The coin bears the Liberty head on the obverse and the mint letter C.

The report of the treasurer of the Bonington Baptist church for the quarter ending September 30 shows that there is a deficiency of almost \$1,000 which is to be made up before next month when the fifth anniversary of the beginning of the pastorate of the Rev. F. R. Morris will be observed with no debt on the church.

Accidently Shot While Shooting Fish. Clayton Williamson, a son of Mrs. Charles Williamson, of Bristol, was accidentally shot Sunday afternoon by Robert Johnson. It appears the two boys were shooting fish at the river. The pistol was a small affair. The boy was taken home and a physician, who was summoned, was unable to locate the ball which was in the fleshy part of the thigh. He is expected to get along all right, unless something new develops.

The selectmen were called Monday to appraise the value of eleven sheep killed by dogs on the farm of Dr. W. S. Stevens in Eastonburgh Falls last Friday night. The farmer, Mrs. Perry, heard the noise of the dogs, and phoned to Mr. Melroy, on another of the farms, and the men with lanterns tried to get sight of the dogs at their work in the field but they escaped. The sheep were bought only a short time ago and cost the doctor \$6.00 each.

A large bull created a good deal of excitement in Stowe on Monday about noon. The animal had been purchased by Bowman Gale and was being taken to Morrisville by Frank Campbell. When near Mrs. Mary Jenney's house the bull became frightened and unmanageable. A large crowd gathered and after a long struggle the animal was subdued. S. H. Kaiser helping to wind the rope around a large telegraph pole, after which it was led away to Smith & Kaiser's slaughter house and later taken to Morrisville. The Campbell boy was knocked down and somewhat injured by the bull.

MANURE CARRIER. by timbers bolted together near the top, carrying the track under their intersection. The track is placed so that it is slightly down grade from the barn to the place where the manure is dumped, so that the bucket runs out by its own weight when loaded.

A rope is attached to the running device to pull the bucket back into the barn. A cord is also attached to the bottom of the bucket, which by pulling will cause the bottom to drop and allow the manure to fall out. Between the track running device and the bucket there is a pulley supplied with ropes which will allow the bucket to be raised and lowered. The bucket can be let down upon the floor, loaded and then pulled up ready to be out and be emptied. An economical way to dispose of the manure is to have a wagon so placed that the manure can be dumped into it and hauled directly to the field. Better still, if the farmer has a spreader it can be placed to receive the manure and crop them spread upon the fields. In this case it is hauled economically and easily. It also saves much of the disagreeable part of manure handling. The bucket need not be touched after it is loaded in the barn. This device is in use on a western farm.—Twentieth Century Farmer.

The Agneszka Bed. If manure is applied to the asparagus bed in autumn or before the frost is out of the ground in the spring it prevents the frost from coming out of the ground and so keeps back the growth unless the manure applied is very fine and is at once entangled into the soil. Sometimes when treatment will keep the asparagus from starting for a week or more at a season when it is most relished.—Green.

YEARLY DEFICIT \$32,956.94.

Annual Report of the St. Johnsbury and Lake Champlain Railroad.

St. Johnsbury, Oct. 18.—The annual report of the directors of the St. Johnsbury & Lake Champlain railroad has just been distributed to the stockholders, the figures being for the year ending June 30, 1906. The gross earnings were \$375,993.02. Deducting operating expenses of \$273,036.40, and taxes amounting to \$9,371.33, the net earnings were \$43,948.29. The latter is all applied to interest on bonds and notes amounting to \$76,905.25, so the year's deficit is \$32,956.94. To this sum must be added accrued interest on bonds owned by the Boston & Maine and Boston & Lowell railroads amounting to \$58,600.

The road is capitalized at \$3,348,500 and is bonded for \$2,500,000. The interest on the bonds is guaranteed by the Boston & Maine railroad, and though to all practical purposes it is a part of their system, it is operated as a separate road.

The statistics show a substantial increase in both freight and passenger traffic during the year and 367,934 tons of freight. The operating expenses and taxes were \$2,925.05 per mile as against \$2,278.30 the year previous, and the gross earnings per mile were \$2,859.26 as against \$2,713.57 the year before.

ARMY SCANDAL YET?

Kaiser Hears That Uniformed Thief Was a Soldier After All.

Berlin, Germany, Oct. 18.—The bold robber who, disguised as an officer of the Guards, placed the city councilors of the town of Cospenick under arrest Tuesday and then looted the municipal safe, has not been traced yet, and his victims can give only a vague description of him. All that is known is that he is about thirty years of age, of a fair complexion, and has a mustache and gray hair. All he was able to steal was 4,002 marks.

The burgomaster and treasurer have published statements. It is believed that their captor really was a soldier. A report of the case has been telegraphed to the Kaiser.
