TEN LIVES LOST.

Charred Bodies Taken From Ruins of Boarding House Fire in Birmingham
Birmingham, Ala., Oct. 20.—Ten men were burned to death and two others were perhaps fatally injured in a fire which destroyed the boarding house of Mrs. E. E. Wattle, between 2 and 3 o'clock this morning. All the bodies were recovered from the ruins. There were 21 boarders in the house, almost all of whom, including the dead, were street railway employees. Mrs. Wattle and her two sons escaped.
All the dead and injured were in the second story of the house. The flames spread so quickly that they could not escape. The fire is thought to have been of incendiary origin. The 10 charred bodies are at the morgue where it is impossible to tell one from the other.

RAID BY INDIANS.

Kill Two Wyoming Cowboys and Slaughter Steers; Soldiers May Pursue.
Chicago, Ill., Oct. 20.—A dispatch to the Chronicle, from Omaha, Neb., says that an outbreak of the Ute Indians occurred near Gillette, Wyo., Wednesday night. In a battle between cowboys and Indians, two of the former were killed and a number of Indians injured.
The Indians killed a number of steers and took the meat home to their camps. Soldiers are expected to be started to Gillette shortly.

STONE PROBATION.

Pleads Guilty to Burglary and is Sentenced.
In county court this week Vernon Stone of Warren, pleaded guilty to burglary and was sentenced to serve not more than one nor more than a year and a half in the state prison. Execution of the sentence is suspended, and the respondent was placed on probation. The crime to which the respondent pleaded guilty was committed at the house of U. G. Austin in Warren.

OFFICE FOR F. S. PLATT.

Likely to Be Appointed Clerk of United States Court.
Brattleboro, Oct. 20.—The announcement that District Attorney James L. Martin of this place is to succeed United States District Judge Hoyt H. Wheeler on the bench, and that Alexander Dunnett of St. Johnsbury is to succeed Martin as district attorney, is likely to be followed by the announcement that Fred S. Platt of Poultney will succeed George E. Johnson of Woodstock as clerk of the United States district court.

Mr. Platt was born in Enosburg September 19, 1857, was educated at Dartmouth college, class of 1874, and became a lawyer. He located in Poultney in 1877. He was state's attorney for Rutland county 1886-88, and was appointed state inspector of finance in 1898, serving until 1904, when he was succeeded by Luther A. Cobb of Island Pond, after a memorable contest between Governor Bell and the Senate, in which the lawmakers tried to effect a veto on the governor's appointment of Cobb in the interest of Platt.

IS AGAIN MISSING.

Montreal Boy Wanderer Shakes Off Rutland Duet.
Rutland, Oct. 20.—Henry Suddler, 14 years of age, the runaway boy from Montreal, who arrived in this city the first of the week and was arrested by Special Officer J. W. Brislin for stealing a ride on the tender of an engine, later being given a position as "bell boy" at the Barrewell, left his situation suddenly yesterday and it is presumed that he went to New York.
When arrested the lad was on his way to New York. The police communicated with his mother in Montreal, but she did not seem anxious for his return. As the lad was rather bright, the local city court officials thought it better to secure work for him than to send him to a reform school.

BANK OF ENGLAND RAISES RATE.

It Is Now at 6 Per Cent, the Highest Point Reached Since the Baring Crash.
London, Eng., Oct. 20.—The Bank of England yesterday raised its minimum rate of discount from 5 to 6 per cent.
The advance of the bank rate was a complete surprise to the stock market and the prices of all securities, including Americans, declined sharply.
The advance in the bank rate would have surprised the market if it had been made Thursday; but, coming as it did on a Friday, it is no exaggeration to say that it created a sensation.
Gold to the amount of \$5,000,000 was shipped to Egypt yesterday.

POLICE DISCIPLINE LAX.

Grand Jury Wants New Chief in San Francisco.
San Francisco, Oct. 20.—The grand jury, in its report filed with Judge Graham, finds that the police department of this city has been lacking in discipline, believes that the enforced vacation of a third of the force has been a factor in the series of crimes recently, and recommends that a new chief of police be appointed for the purpose of preserving and maintaining discipline in the departments for the better protection of the city's interest.
