

### STILL CONTINUE.

Holdups and Burglaries Reported from Pittsburg, Despite Police Work.

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 15.—Despite the efforts of city officials and the police department to put an end to the burglaries and holdups in this city and notwithstanding the dragnet that has been thrown out by the public protectors, reports of holdups and burglaries continue to reach the public. In the fashionable East end section of the city, where most of the recent crimes have been committed, the house of W. A. Forman, a prominent mechanical engineer, was entered by burglars between midnight and daylight yesterday morning.

Among the articles taken by the thieves was a revolver recently purchased by Mr. Forman to protect himself against any occasion of this kind. The house was robbed while Mr. and Mrs. Forman were visiting.

Despatches from points in Allegheny county outside of this city and also towns in neighboring counties continue to recount stories of crime and violence. From Bradock it was reported Tuesday night that John F. Edwards, a night employee of the Pennsylvania railroad, was knocked down and robbed by two negroes.

Holdup men are active in McKeesport and the counsils there have been impounded for more police. Two cases were reported from that city. One Messenger was attacked by five men, but escaped with his money after a fight. George Hallett, a night employee of a steel mill, was attacked by three negroes, who secured but 25 cents.

At Sharon, in Mercer county, Michael Root is in a serious condition with a wound in his head. He cannot speak, but the police say he was held up and beaten. Joseph Giffin, employed by the Pittsburg & Lake Erie railroad at Newell, Washington county, was attacked by an unknown Italian while at work Tuesday. Giffin's throat was cut, and the assailant stood off pursuers with two revolvers and escaped to the hills.

In Fayette county an attempt was made to break into the store of H. B. Loveland at Uniontown. The burglars had prepared bundles of clothing to take away when Mr. Loveland opened fire on them. The men escaped.

## EARTHQUAKE IN JAMAICA.

The Heaviest Shock Experienced in Many Years.

Kingston, Jamaica, Nov. 15.—An exceedingly sharp earthquake was felt south and north of this island at eleven o'clock Tuesday night. It was followed immediately by a second shock, which was the heaviest experienced here in many years.

## THE LABORER'S HIRE

ORGANIZED AND INDEPENDENT WORKERS COMPARED.

Why a Certain Class of Working People Have Shared Labor's Improved Condition—An Argument in Favor of Trades Unions.

The Newark Sunday Call, discussing the progress made by trades unions during the past ten years, says:

"The regrettable feature of the progress made is that it has not been equally distributed. Some trades have had great benefits, but many have not received substantial advantage and a few none at all. The class of working people who seem to have actually suffered is that large, respectable and altogether worthy body filling small clerical positions."

No better argument in favor of trades and labor unions could be advanced than is contained in the above quotation, writes Joseph R. Buchanan in the New York Journal. What the Call states is true, and what its statements imply is truer still.

Without exception the trades in which the progress is most marked are those in which the workers have secured the best organization. And the other side of the proposition may be stated just as strongly:

Those branches of labor which have the least organization or no organization at all have shared least in the advancement of the last ten years. The "large, respectable and altogether worthy body filling small clerical positions" are practically without organization, and they have no one but themselves to blame for their condition.

They have not been overlooked and neglected by the great organization movement which has taken into its arms nearly every other class of workers. More time and energy have been expended in attempts to help these "altogether worthy" persons to help themselves than have been devoted to any other branch of labor.

Labor? There has been the rub of the trouble. A majority of those occupying clerical positions scoff at the thought that they are laborers. They are just a bit too "respectable" in accordance with an idea of respectability which is happily almost obsolete.

They have spurned the thought that methods which have been employed by greasy mechanics and hodcarriers could be of benefit to "business men." This was foolish and has proved fatal to the hopes of thousands—tens of thousands—engaged in clerical positions.

How often we hear some such remark as this: "Just think of a bricklayer receiving \$5.00 for an eight hour day, while first class accountants, expert stenographers and the like, occupying positions of responsibility, have to work for half that sum."

If the accountant and stenographer don't know why such conditions prevail they lack the intelligence possessed by the bricklayer. The latter can tell you why he works only eight hours a day and receives nearly twice as much pay as was given him for a ten hour day not many years ago.

Organization is what those employed at clerical work need. Most of them have had opportunities to learn the lesson of combination from their employers. It seems, however, that they have preferred to cling to the motto of an effete commercialism—competition.

It is no answer to say that there are so many engaged at clerical work that the stream of recruits is so large and constant that organization is impossible. The same thing might be said with emphasis of the "pick and shovel" workers. In addition to the home output of laborers Europe sends us half a million, more or less, each year.

And yet we have powerful unions of excavators, hodcarriers and other laborers, and the union of coal miners is one of the strongest organizations in the country.

Two things are needed to put those filling clerical positions on the road to improved conditions—first, they must realize that they are laborers; second, they must become imbued with the progressive spirit of the age, which is co-operation for mutual benefit.

### SIRENS AND SONS.

Lord Townshend, declared an imbecile by the English courts and restrained from managing his own affairs, retains his seat and vote in the house of lords.

Sir Robert Hart of the Chinese customs has been raised to the highest rank of Chinese nobility by having his ancestors for three generations back created mandarins of the highest rank.

Major Herbert J. Slocum of the Second cavalry, a nephew of the widow of the late Russell Sage, will soon tender his resignation from the army, to take up the active management of the Sage estate, of which the father of Major Slocum is executor.

Senor Enrique Cortes, the new Colombian minister to the United States, has spent most of his life in the financial world of London. For a quarter of a century he has been at the head of one of the biggest South American banking houses in that city.

Ex-Mayor Seth Low of New York will build a magnificent country house near Bedford, N. Y., the ground comprising two large farms, and it will be one of the finest estates in the country when completed in the spring. Immense stock bars are also to be built.

The youngest member of the new Maine senate is the Hon. Walter B. Clark of Bowdoin. He is a graduate of Bowdoin, where he played four years on the varsity football team. He is an attorney by profession, having graduated at the Harvard Law school.

Joseph Jenkins Lee, American minister to Ecuador and the youngest officer of his rank in the diplomatic service of the United States, has been elected a member of the Royal Geographical Society of Great Britain in recognition of his services in the cause of geographical science at the time of his expedition to Acre.

The strain of controlling the fastest of modern express trains from a locomotive cab generally wears down even the most placid nerves before many years pass, yet Charles Lynch, who runs three of the fleets, 87, 908 and 878, between Jersey City and Philadelphia, is the oldest man of his trade in the service of the Pennsylvania railroad. He has been at the throttle for forty-eight years.

### INDUSTRIAL ITEMS.

The daily production of woolen hats in the town of Monza, Italy, is about 150,000. There are fourteen factories, with 7,000 employees.

One of the latest food products coming from Holland, that land of agricultural industry, is honey vinegar, which is now manufactured there on a commercial scale. The particular characteristics of vinegar made from honey are its agreeable aroma and pleasant taste.

Tantalum, one of the hardest metals known, is being manufactured by the Germans into sheets and bars by the squiring process, the material in its original powdered form being mixed with water and gum tragacanth and then forced into rods and shapes as desired.
