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ROOSEVELT FOR PLATT'S PLACE.

This is the Plan of the New York Republican Leaders.

New York, Nov. 23.—If Senator Platt succeeds in serving out his term in the Senate, there is little doubt in the minds of the Republican leaders of this state that his successor will be Theodore Roosevelt. It now seems probable that even if the former Republican leader should retire from the Senate, Mr. Roosevelt will be chosen for the full term beginning two years hence. His friends here believe that there will be no opposition to him, no matter who may be chosen for the unexpired term in the event of Senator Platt's withdrawal. In spite of the announcements made by Senator Platt and his intimates that he has no idea of resigning, there is reason to believe he will have his resignation in the hands of Governor-elect Hughes soon after the beginning of the year. If Senator Platt should resign his seat in January there will undoubtedly be a spirited contest in the legislature over the election of his immediate successor. The list of possible candidates contains the names of Timothy L. Woodruff, Representative; J. Stuart Fassett, Frank S. Black, B. R. Odell, Jr., and a dozen other Republican leaders. Friends of Herbert Parsons believe that he would be the strongest candidate who could be named, but he has given no encouragement to the idea that he might enter the lists.

MOROCCO WAR NEAR?

May be One to Force Algerias Regulations

MADRID PUBLIC DISTURBED

By Use of Warships—Troops Are Held Ready for Sailing Orders—Suggestion That Kaiser Backs Raisuli to Make Trouble.

London, Nov. 23.—The Tangier correspondent of the Express says the situation is exceedingly serious. France and Spain have agreed to combine and force Europe's terms as formulated at Algiers on Morocco, and in order to do this they will have to land troops and fight. This means another little war, which will be lively and serious while it lasts, although the outcome is certain.

SPANISH PUBLIC DISTURBED.

Fears a Costly and Futile Expedition Will Be Made.

Madrid, Nov. 23.—The continued dispatch of the battleship Pelayo, the cruiser Infanta Isabel and the gunboat Maria de Molina to Tangier, and the reported intention to concentrate five thousand troops at Cadiz to re-enforce Ceuta and Melilla if necessary, are causing increased anxiety to the public, a majority of whom dread being involved in a costly and inglorious enterprise. Senator Alvarado, the minister of marine, announced in the Chamber of Deputies Wednesday that the alarm was groundless. He added that the warships already at Tangier would be withdrawn when the Infanta Isabel, Pelayo and Maria de Molina arrived there. Moreover, they were only sent to insure the carrying out of the Algerias agreement. Despite this statement the anxiety is not allayed. The warships carry five hundred troops, and it is stated that five hundred more will shortly follow. It is also reported that France is preparing to despatch five thousand troops to co-operate with the Spanish forces.

The Liberal newspapers attack the government. They urge prudence in handling the Moroccan question. The Imparcial covertly accuses "a certain powerful person in Europe," doubtless meaning Emperor William, of backing Raisuli in fomenting disturbances in Morocco. El Liberal exclaims: "May the providence which watches over drunkards and lunatics protect us in this enterprise."

Four companies of Spanish infantry stationed at Algierias have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness to start for Morocco should developments in the situation there require the landing of foreign troops.

CANADA TAKES SMALL ISLANDS.

Arctic Expedition Raises Flag Over Several—Franklin Relics Found.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 23.—The marine department has received a report from Captain Ennis, commander of the exploring expedition on board the Arctic. Captain Ennis, commander of the expedition, reported that he visited the old camp of the Franklin expedition and found some relics there. The Arctic will winter at Pond's Inlet, Baffin's Bay, and next spring will push as far north as possible along the west coast of Greenland. Captain Ennis has raised the Union Jack on a number of small islands.

MORGAN GAVE \$20,000 FOR HUGHES

Total Contributions to Republican Fund Were \$333,923.

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 23.—The Republican and Democratic state committees have filed statements of their receipts and expenditures in the recent campaign and election. The Republican state committee certified that it received \$333,923, of which \$213,923 was in contributions and \$20,000 was borrowed from Timothy L. Woodruff, chairman of the Republican state committee. The expenditures were \$332,911. Among the contributors were J. P. Morgan, \$20,000; Levi P. Morton & Co., \$20,000; Timothy L. Woodruff, \$10,000; Andrew Carnegie, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., \$5,000 each; C. H. Dewey, John W. Gates, William P. Clyde, H. S. Black, \$2,000 each. The Democratic state committee's receipts were \$89,170, and expenditures \$79,397.53. William Randolph Hearst, the candidate for governor, is reported to have paid three sums of \$35,000, \$15,000 and \$7,000 respectively; Louis Stuyvesant Chanler \$5,000; Thomas J. Gillerman \$10,000; William J. Conners \$3,500; John H. Cox \$1,500; Arthur Brisbane \$1,000.

POSTOFFICE SAFES RIFLED.

Burglars Get \$550 in Cash and \$30 in Stamps at Hoosick Falls.

Hoosick Falls, N. Y., Nov. 23.—The postoffice here was robbed some time after two o'clock yesterday morning, the job being accomplished in a few minutes. Nitro-glycerine was used and the big safe ruined. The robbers got \$550 in money and \$30 in stamps and escaped. They were frightened away before reaching the vault, which was intact and held stamps to the value of several thousand dollars.

The explosion was mild, sounding like a pistol shot. Entrance was effected by forcing the back door, which had been secured with four locks. The door was opened without breaking the glass, and the work rushed. Authorities at Washington were wired, also the inspector at New York. Rensselaer county officials have detailed Sheriff Myers on the case.

MODUS VIVENDI CHANGED.

Its Practical Working Has Not Been Changed.

London, Nov. 23.—The United States government has made friendly representations to the government of Great Britain regarding the action of the New England officials against Colonial fishermen enlisting on board American vessels. The American representations are under consideration at the foreign office. In the House of Commons yesterday, Foreign Secretary Gray said he was not prepared at present with information available to say when New Foundland's action was a total breach of the modus vivendi on fishery question, but he added, impractical working had not been intended with.



FINED \$18,000 FOR REBATING.

The Penalty Fixed Against the New York Central.

New York, Nov. 23.—Judge Holt in the United States circuit court yesterday fined the New York Central & Hudson River railroad company \$18,000 for rebating freight charges to the American Sugar Refining company.

The fine was the result of an indictment charging the company with rebating in the sum of \$26,000 to the American Sugar Refining company, on which charge the defendant company had been found guilty. Sentence in the case of the American Sugar Refining company, convicted of receiving the rebates, was deferred until next Tuesday on request of counsel for the company. There were two counts in the indictment against the New York Central and a fine of \$108,000 already had been imposed on the first count. In passing sentence Judge Holt denied the contention that a corporation cannot be fined. He declared that corporation is responsible for the act of its employees under the provisions of the Elkins act.

SIX FIRES SET CAUSE PANICS.

Scores Flee to the Streets in Gotham and Rescues from Smoke Are Many.

New York, Nov. 22.—Six incendiary fires within an area of half a dozen city blocks caused intense excitement in the vicinity of Twenty-fourth street and Eighth avenue early yesterday. One woman was so severely injured that she may die, hundreds of lives were endangered and thousands fled to the streets in fear.

There were many thrilling rescues by police and firemen and several persons had remarkable escapes from death on flame-swept fire escapes. The financial loss was comparatively small. In every instance, however, the smoke from the flames filled the houses and had sent the tenants fleeing to the streets. Before the last fire was extinguished the crowds in the street numbered many thousands. The police made a thorough search of the neighborhood for the burglar, but no arrests have yet been made.

DISCOVER PLOT TO KILL.

Astrakan Governor-General Is Marked and Terrorists Have Been Taken.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 23.—A despatch received here from Astrakan yesterday reported the discovery of a plot to kill Governor General Sokoloff and the arrest of the terrorists implicated.

NO ACTION ON CONGO.

Washington Has Made No Offer to Berlin.

London, Nov. 23.—Replying in the House of Commons yesterday to a question of Sir Charles Dilke, who asked if the government was aware that the government of the United States was prepared to co-operate in action against the abuses in the Congo Independent State, and desired to be represented at any conference on the subject, Foreign Secretary Gray said that no such communication had reached the British government from the United States.

POPE YIELDS TO FRANCE?

He Is Said to Have Approved "Lawful" Association.

Paris, Nov. 23.—The pope's approval of the diocesan association formed by Cardinal Lecot, Archbishop of Bordeaux, according to the Matin, arrived Wednesday. It is added that if the pope pronounced it to be in accordance with the canon of the church it furnishes a possible solution of the association question under the church and state separation law. As minister of worship, Briand has already accepted the Lecot scheme as legal.
