CLASH WITH PULUJANES

Constabulary in Fight in Leyte Philippines

FOUR SOLDIERS KILLED

9 Hurt, Among Them a Lieutenant—30 Natives Dead While Many Are Taken—Philippine Commission Reduces Fineness of the Peso.

Manila, P. I., Dec. 8.—Later returns of the fighting in the island of Leyte, December 5, show that Capt. Samuel V. Ham, with a detachment of company L of the 8th infantry and a force of constabulary under Lieut. Ralph P. Yates, Jr., were rushed by 60 holo men, four miles from La Paz, on the Taragona trail, during the afternoon of that day.

Five Americans were killed and nine were injured. The enemy lost 30 men killed. The number of Pulujanes wounded and captured is not known.

A detachment has started in pursuit of the insurgents. The telegraph line between Tacloban and Holo is down and no further details are obtainable.

The list of the American dead is as follows:

Sergt. Joseph Clark, died of a holo wound.

Sergt. James Prover, killed with a holo.

Priv. William Dufferin, killed with a holo.

Priv. W. Hadley, gunshot.

Priv. Edward Keogh, gunshot.

The Americans wounded were Corp. Wells, priv. Melhery, priv. Edge and priv. Walden, all severely wounded, and privs. Armstrong, Brennan, Heron, Holst and Richardson, slightly wounded.

The dead were buried on the battlefield during the night of December 5.

All the wounded are doing well. The wound of Lieut. Yates, which at first was reported to be slight, is now said to be serious.

No report has been received of any further losses among the constabulary.

"COFFIN" AMUSES A COURT.

Big Box Causes Laughter During the Trial of Mutual Life's Suit.

London, Dec. 8.—There was a momentary break in the general dullness of the evidence in the suit of the Mutual Life Insurance company against the North British and Mercantile Insurance company and D. C. Haldeman, former London manager of the Mutual, which began here yesterday before Justice Swinfen-Daly, when two ushers staggered into the court with a heavy brown box, which one of the plaintiffs' counsel, amid general laughter, informed the court was known in the Mutual's office as "the coffin."

It was this "coffin" which Haldeman is alleged to have removed from the London office with the names and addresses of the Mutual's British policyholders. A witness testified to placing cards with the names, etc., therein. He never saw them again.

SUSPECT TWO FIREBUGS.
