



COLLEGE AND SCHOOL.

The federal bureau of education reports that there are now 588 city school systems in the United States, with a total enrollment of 4,574,403 pupils and an average daily attendance of 3,334,600, an increase of 105,252 from the previous year. In private and parochial schools there were 1,000,582 pupils, an increase of 99,017.
