CHINESE REVOLT CONTINUES.

The Provinces Co-operating to Crush the Disorders. Pekin, Jan. 9.—According to private advices received here the trouble in Kiang-Si province are not yet at an end. The rebels are taking refuge in the mountains. Reports from Shan-Tung show a state of great unrest, and raiding and robbery are frequent. Many people are moving into the cities and walled towns. The most striking feature in the suppression of the present disorders is the co-operation of the officials of the different provinces, for up to the present time each province has acted in this respect for itself.

Will Address Midwinter Banquet Sons of Revolution. Burlington, Jan. 9.—President W. J. Van Patten of the Vermont Society Sons of the American Revolution has received from ex-Gov. Henry C. It is expected that the banquet will be held early in February, but the date and place have not yet been chosen.

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ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges. The First Regiment band, Brattleboro, will give a minstrel show next spring.

During the past year there were 29 marriages, 45 births, and 48 deaths in Randolph.

Robert H. Ford, of St. Albans, has sent the governor his resignation as member of the board of normal school commissioners.

Within a week about 125 Italians have arrived in Bennington from New York to work on the trolley road which the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Co. is building.

At the morning roll-call at the Vermont soldiers' home, Bennington, one morning recently, there were one hundred men present, twenty-two of whom were in the hospital.

Dr. Henry Tucker, health officer at Brattleboro, reports that scarlet fever is spreading in that place, there being five cases of the disease. He has been unable to determine the origin of the disease.

A Record of Births. During the month of December there were sixty children born in Burlington which is the largest number ever recorded for a single month in the history of the city.

There were 22 boys and 28 girls. The oldest infant was 47 and the youngest 16 years old. Five mothers were in their teens; thirty-three were in their 20s; seventeen were in their 30s; five were in their 40s.

Twenty children were first borns; in two families the new arrival was No. 9; in two more families it was No. 11; in still two more families it was No. 12; and in one family it was the fourteenth child.

To Instruct National Guard Officers. Orders have been issued by Gov. Fletcher D. Proctor for the commissioned officers of the Vermont National Guard to meet in Brattleboro January 22 and 23. Col. J. Grey Estey of Brattleboro will conduct a course of instruction which will embrace all branches of military subjects. Officers are ordered to prepare themselves for an examination, either written or oral. Col. J. Gray Estey, Maj. H. Edward Dyer, and Capt. W. W. Russell will observe and report to the commander in chief upon the work done. All officers appointed previous to January 17 are ordered to report to Colonel Estey at Brattleboro at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon of January 21 for examination. The quartermaster-general will provide the necessary expenses of officers elected and one day's per diem for the examining board.

Eggs Continue Plenty And Prices Easy. FOR THIS TIME OF YEAR.

Chickens Are Fitter and Dressed Pork Is Coming Slowly—Dressed Pork 8@8 1/2—Butter Remains Unchanged.

Barre, Vt., Jan. 9, 1907. Eggs continue plenty and the price easy for the time of year. Chickens are fitter and dressed pork coming slowly. We quote wholesale prices as follows: Dressed pork—Limited supply at 8@8 1/2.

Butter—Unchanged; dairy, 27@28c; creamery, 30@31c. Potatoes—Easy and prices steady.

Beef and Hogs a Shade Better in Price—Lamb As Firm. St. Johnsbury, Jan. 9.—Milkers are lower, 25@26c. Beef and hogs are a shade better. Sheep and lambs very firm.

IN BOSTON MARKETS. Eggs Continue to Work Lower—Butter Maintains a Firm Tone. Boston, Jan. 9.—The local butter market maintains a firm tone, but business does not improve much. Indeed, with the exception of fine storage goods, sales are few and generally of small lots. Cheese does not change much. The demand is light, but offerings are correspondingly small, and prices hold up well.

Eggs continue to work lower. Receipts are not heavy, but the demand is so slack that they do not clear up well, hence there is a disposition to shade rates for the purpose of creating a demand.

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MAY INVESTIGATE DEATHS. Inquiry May Be Made Into Last Hours of Father and Son. Everett, Mass., Jan. 9.—The Everett police said Monday night that they had heard nothing of a report that an investigation had been ordered by the New Hampshire authorities into the death of Elmer F. Fernald and his father, which occurred in this city during the latter part of December.

The younger Fernald died here on December 26, apparently as the result of inhaling smoke from a small fire in his room. The fire was attributed to ashes from his pipe, which Fernald had been smoking at the time. His father, a well-known farmer, died in the same room a few days later. The death of the former being laid to the shock also suffered when he discovered the husband's body.

The death of the older man was attributed to apoplexy.

NEW QUAROG MINE FOUND. Fishermen of New Bedford Make Lucky Strike. New Bedford, Mass., Jan. 9.—An important find of new and extensive beds of quarog has just been made between Beacon and Blockport, off this port. The discovery is a great boon to many fishermen of this vicinity, who for some time have been forbidden by law from dredging.

The new beds lie in forty feet of water, and the shells are reported in greater numbers than in the old beds in their best days. Many of the fishermen get more than five bushels of quarog a day, getting \$1.50 a bushel for the large and \$2.50 a bushel for the little-necked shells.

FILIPINOS AWAIT ROOSEVELT. Expect the President to Open Their Assembly in October. Manila, Jan. 9.—The election for the next assembly will be held on July 30, 1907. The election law after the third reading, with some immaterial amendments, will be passed this week.

President Roosevelt and Secretary of War Taft are expected to open the assembly in October next. The Filipino press is enthusiastic over the expected visit of the President.
