WILL URGE SHIP SUBSIDY

President To Ask For Passage Of Pending Bill

SPECIAL MESSAGE COMING

It May Be Sent to Congress Tomorrow and It May Be Deferred Until Next Week—His Aid Was Besought.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 18.—Within the next few days President Roosevelt will send a special message to Congress urging the passage of the ship subsidy bill, which has been reported to the House by the committee on merchant marine and fisheries.

When some of the advocates of the subsidy bill almost despaired of getting a favorable report from the committee the President was besought to use his influence in their behalf by sending a special message to Congress on the subject. He declined to do so until some further effort had been made looking to harmonious action among the Republicans, but now that the committee has acted favorably in the subsidy bill, Mr. Roosevelt deems it timely to send in a strong message calling attention to the need of this legislation.

The message may be sent in Saturday, if the House is in session, or it may be deferred until early next week.

FORAKER FIRES UP AGAIN.

Reiterates Statement of Position on Negro Soldier Case.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 18.—Senator Foraker yesterday renewed his attack on the policy of the President in discharging three companies of the Twenty-fifth Infantry (negro) for participation in the Brownsville riot. He was led to a discussion of the constitutional phases of the question by the fact that Senator Blackburn, the Democratic leader, presented an amendment to the Foraker substitute resolution of inquiry, providing that this resolution should not question or deny the legal right of the President to discharge without honor the enlisted men of the army.

The presentation of this amendment at once brought the constitutional question again foremost, and Senator Foraker proceeded to reiterate his views as he expressed them Dec. 20. He said he could not agree to this amendment; that he was opposed to excluding consideration of the constitutional question in this way. He asserted strongly again that it was the right of the President to command the army, and of Congress to raise armies and provide regulations therefor.

AGAINST CONTRACT JOB.

Congressmen Make a Protest to the President.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 18.—On behalf of a strong element in the House appropriations committee, Representative Litwiler of New York made a strong protest to the President yesterday against letting a contract for the construction of the Panama Canal be

urged that there was a positive sentiment in the committee that the government should build the canal itself. He also saw Secretary Taft on a like mission.

Despite this protest, after a conference between the President, Secretary Root, Secretary Taft and Chairman Shonts of the Canal Commission, the announcement was made that if Oliver H. Bangs, the lowest of the bidders, can qualify financially, the contract should be granted to him.

MANY RESCUES AT THIS FIRE

Dozen Helpless Women and Children Saved

THE HYDRANTS FROZEN UP

Tenement Building in Lowell, Mass., Burned Like Tinder, While the Firemen Were Practically Powerless to Stop the Fire.

Lowell, Mass., Jan. 18.—A dozen were rescued and 50 lives endangered by a fire here yesterday in a three-story tenement block.

With the thermometer 10 below zero and hampered by frozen hydrants, the firemen had a tough time.

A dozen helpless women and children were rescued by Sergeant John Freeman, a police officer. The block blazed like a match box and it was impracticable that no lives were lost.

The doors of sleeping tenants kicked in by patrolmen, and men and women rushed into the street in their night clothes.

It was fully 30 minutes after the arrival of the firemen that the first line of hose was manned. There was not enough pressure to carry the water to the second story.

Unable for a time to effectually combat the flames, the firemen assisted the police in rescuing the tenants, many of whom were pinned in like rats. A family of Poles in one room from which egress was cut off by the fire, were saved only after the windows of their tenement had been broken down.

Several of the tenants were injured, the most serious being Mrs. Annie Hunt, who fell down a flight of stairs into the cellar in trying to reach the street.

The fire was got under control at 7 o'clock, after other buildings had been threatened.

It is believed that an overheated stove in one of the rooms was the cause of the fire. The property is owned by Joseph Martin. The loss will be several thousand, partially covered by insurance.

THREATENED THE VILLAGE.

Fire Finally Extinguished at Auburn, R. I., Loss \$25,000.

Auburn, R. I., Jan. 18.—A \$25,000 fire, which threatened at one time to sweep this town, was extinguished early yesterday by the heroic efforts of the local firemen, who worked desperately while their hands, faces and even their feet were being frozen by cold and water.

The zero weather was had enough, but the firemen were further handicapped by falling water, which wet their clothing and froze wherever it struck.

Slayer of Woman and Three Children Indifferent to Fate.

Washington, Pa., Jan. 18.—Elmer Dempster, the 19-year-old negro who was convicted of killing Mrs. James Pearce and her three children on July 29 last

at Canonsburg, Pa., was hanged in the jail yard here yesterday. Dempster was apparently indifferent to his fate. According to Dempster, his only motive for the murder was robbery.
