## TO COMPEL 'FRISCANS

United States Begins Two Suits For Japan IN THE SCHOOL FIGHT First Is to Compel Enforcement of the Treaty With Japan, Giving the Japanese Equal School Advantages With Americans.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 19.—The United States has begun two suits in San Francisco to enforce the provisions of the treaty with Japan giving to the Japanese equal school advantages. One of the actions is brought in the supreme court of the state of California, in the name of a Japanese child, to obtain a writ of mandamus to compel his admission to one of the public schools from which he is excluded by the action of the board of education. The proceeding in the second suit is a comprehensive bill in equity filed by the United States in the federal circuit court, in which the members of the board of education, the superintendent of schools and all of the principals of the various primary and grammar schools of San Francisco are made defendants. In both proceedings the government alleges the execution of the treaty with Japan in 1895, which provides that "in whatever relates to the rights of residence and travel" the subjects of each party to the treaty shall enjoy in the territories of the other "the same privileges, liberties and rights as citizens or subjects of the most favored nation." The state of California having expressly provided that every school in a district must be open to all children of school age resident within the said district, the privilege of such attendance is alleged to be clearly one of the said "rights of residence" for Japanese children resident in that state, to be enjoyed on the footing of the most favored nation.

The bill alleges that the Japanese are not in any sense "Mongolians," but from a separate and distinct race, and it is asserted that for more than twenty years and until recently the authorities in California have conceded that the Japanese are not included in the term "Mongolian," and admitted them to all the public schools. It is held by the government that the acts complained of constitute a flagrant violation of the treaty between the United States and Japan; that, properly construed, the law of California does not justify them, and that if it does it is null and void.

**WILL USE BETHEL GRANITE.** Contract for Building of American Bank Note Co. in New York. Bethel, Jan. 19.—The Woodbury Granite company has just closed the contract for furnishing granite for the Bethel quarries for the construction of a new building to be erected this season on Wall street in New York city by the American Bank Note company. The building will be four stories high. The contract price is about \$85,000 and the material will make about seventy-five carloads. Granite has been discovered on the land of F. L. Spaulding in Barnard.

**WOULD GIVE POWER TO RETIRE U. S. JUDGES** De Armond of Missouri Thinks It Would Improve The Courts—Gives Power to President.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 19.—Representative De Armond of Missouri has introduced a bill in the House authorizing the president to retire any judge of the United States when he thinks the retirement of such a judge would promote the public welfare, and giving the president power, by and with the advice of the Senate, to fill the vacancy thus created. When asked today if the provisions of his bill extend to the supreme court of the United States Mr. De Armond replied that, in his opinion, they do. 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**MAY DELAY THAW TRIAL** Previous Case Halted By Illness Yesterday **COUNTESS ALICE ARRIVES** Thus Rumor of Break in Thaw Family Relation Is Dissipated—Says She Is Her Mother's Daughter Still.

New York, Jan. 19.—Simultaneously with the arrival yesterday from Europe of the countess of Yarmouth, sister of Harry K. Thaw, the slayer of Stanford Whites, comes the possibility that the trial may be delayed beyond Monday of next week, the time now set. This possible delay will grow out of the Hilgert "magic boots" case, now on trial before Justice Fitzgerald, who will try Thaw, and in the same court room set aside for that trial. This case was temporarily adjourned yesterday morning because of the illness of the four-weeks-old child of Juror Eugene Bernard. The juror is unable to return; a mistress will be declared. In that case Justice Fitzgerald may elect to order a new trial of the "magic boots" case at once, thus putting back the Thaw trial until the other case is finished. Mrs. William Thaw, mother of the prisoner, and Mrs. George Lander Carnegie, his sister, were at the pier early to meet the countess of Yarmouth, but owing to the fog they had a long wait. The steamship Kaiserin Auguste Victoria passed quarantine at 9 o'clock, but it took hours for her to come up to her dock. There were many persons at the pier to witness the meeting between mother and daughter. The countess of Yarmouth is expected to have great influence for good over her brother, the prisoner, and whatever the family counsel decides shall be done in the case will be impressed upon Thaw by the countess. She was met at quarantine by her brother, Edward, and on the way up the bay she was fully informed of the feeling of the family here as to the best line of action to be taken.

**8625,000 INHERITANCE TAX.** Paid by the Estate of Russell Sage—Valued at \$90,000. Albany, N. Y., Jan. 19.—State Comptroller Glynn has received \$825,000, the amount due the state on the estate of Russell Sage under the inheritance tax act. The value of the estate has been placed at \$90,000,000, but that amount is not the final estimate. The state has given a temporary receipt for the money received. The money just received is the largest ever collected to the state for this purpose, with three exceptions. In 1900 the state collected of George Smith, a wealthy English merchant, who died in New York city, \$1,933,753. In 1901 \$665,000 was received from the C. E. Huntington estate, and in 1902 the inheritance tax from the estate of Warren Smith, a carpet manufacturer, was \$978,348.

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
