



WALL STREET ALL AT SEA

Was a Violent Decline in Prices Yesterday

HEAVY SELLING OF STEEL

One of Members on Being Asked the Reason for the Break Declared "Too Much Roosevelt"—Real Reason Not Apparent.

New York, Jan. 19.—A condition of affairs verging almost on a panic ruled yesterday on the Stock Exchange. Prices melted away rapidly in all directions, and no support seemed to be extended to any stock. Frightened shareholders threw over their stocks, regardless of what they could get for them, while the bears did all they could to help the decline along. Losses ranged all the way from 1 to 13 points, with trading growing in volume and prices declined.

There was no definite news of an unfavorable character to account for the violent slump. There were plenty of rumors, however, and nobody stopped to inquire if there was any basis of fact for them. It seemed as if the more extravagant they were the quicker they were accepted as coming from "inside sources." There was talk of a big short-time note issue by the New York Central, but this stock was no weaker than any of the other standards. Rumor of other new stock issues also were heard, but no roads were specified. One broker, when asked his opinion as to the reason for the decline merely replied: "Too much Roosevelt."

Slender rumors about this house and that house being in trouble, and which are always heard at a time of demoralization, were also put in circulation. None of them could be traced however, to any definite source, and none of them could be confirmed. In fact, Wall street was all at sea, and the decline was all the more disconcerting because of the mystery as to the real reason behind it.
