### EMPLOYERS LIABLE.

Domestic Servants in Great Britain to Be Compensated for Injuries.  
There is a feature of the British workmen's compensation act which will be in force from July 1, 1907, that shows the thoroughness of the legislation secured through the efforts of the labor members of the recent parliament. Not only does the act provide for the payment of indemnity to mechanics and laborers in cases of damage by accident, but domestic servants are also included in the protected classes.  
According to the last census, there are 1,941,154 female domestic servants in Great Britain. The new responsibilities of these servants may be summarized as follows:  
In the event of death resulting from an accident the liability of the employer is the payment of three years' wages and an allowance for board, the total sum not to exceed \$450. For temporary disablement one-half the wages and an allowance for board must be paid during the period of incapacity. In the event of permanent disablement the provision is the same as in the case of temporary disablement, even though the person disabled may be incapacitated from work for a lifetime of many years.  
The accident insurance companies are adjusting their premium rates on domestic servants to meet the conditions which will exist after the 1st of July next. Another adjustment due to the passage of the act will be the collection of the insurance premiums from employers instead of from servants.  
The premium per employee per annum in the domestic class will probably be \$1.20, although doubtless reductions will be given by some companies apportioned in accordance with the surroundings of employment.—New York Journal.
