

WILL EXTEND TO MANCHESTER.

Deerfield Valley Railroad Will Go Through Stratton and Winhall.

Much interest is taken all through the Deerfield valley in the railroad and other developments in the upper waters of that river. The principal event of late has been the opening of the new railroad that runs 16 miles back into the lumber district, from the mountain north in the town of Wilmington, through Searsburg, into the town of Somerset, to the foot of Glastenbury mountain.

This line is built by the Deerfield Valley Railroad company, in which the Deerfield Lumber company and Connecticut Valley Lumber company stock holders are supposed to be largely interested. It is announced that this line will be built 14 miles farther the coming season, through the towns of Stratton and Winhall, to Manchester, where it will come out on the hills two miles from and 1,000 feet above Manchester depot on the Rutland railroad.

The enormous timber tract in these towns is not being slaughtered with such slight regard to forestry as a few years ago. The Deerfield Lumber company have had the advice of a government expert, and are not taking out trees of less than eight to ten inches on the stump, so that they claim that they can keep a perpetual supply.

Smart Man Got Money From The Post-office Department. New York, Feb. 26.—A new scheme by which the post-office department during the last few months has lost a large amount of money in this city, Brooklyn, Philadelphia, Boston and Chicago, was disclosed yesterday, when a post-office inspector arraigned before United States Commissioner Shields, a young Romanian named Louis W. Charlat, a dealer in postage stamps.

Montpelier, Feb. 27.—The American Marble company have filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state, with their office at Fair Haven, to do a general business in the manufacture of all products from marble, and also to handle brass and bronze. They have a capital stock of \$30,000, which is divided into 300 shares at \$100 per share. The subscribers are Herbert O. Allen, Osgood, Ia., Mary A., Enda L., Edward E. and Harriet L. Allen, all of Fair Haven.

Papers of dissolution have been filed by the Burlington Mills with the secretary of state. The company have sold their lease of property and their business to the American Woolen company. The Burlington Mills were incorporated under the laws of the state of Maine in 1903, and have been doing business in Burlington for three years.

IN LOCAL MARKETS

Eggs Are Firm and in Good Demand.

DRESSED PORK UNCHANGED

Fancy Veals Find a Ready Market—The Egg Market in Boston Also Continues to Be Good.

IN BOSTON MARKETS.

Butter Market Has a Firm Tone—Prices Hold Well. Boston, Feb. 27.—The local butter market has a firm tone, with prices holding about as last reported. There is a steady, moderate demand for fine fresh creamery stock at 32 cents, and some special marks bring about a cent a pound more. Most of the arrivals of fresh stock are more or less defective, and for such stock 29@31c is the range. Fine storage butter is in steady request at well sustained prices. Fancy dairy butter is wanted. Boxes and prints are fairly active.

PERKINS IS ABSOLVED.

No Larceny, Says The Court of Appeals. Albany, N. Y., Feb. 27.—The court of appeals yesterday decided in favor of George W. Perkins, vice-president of the New York Life Insurance company and a member of the firm of J. Pierpont Morgan & Co., in the matter of charge of grand larceny, made against him in connection with the payment of the funds of the New York Life to the Republican national campaign in 1904. The decision is by a divided court, voting four to three. The majority held that there was no larceny, owing to the absence of criminal intent. Chief Judge Collins, in a dissenting opinion, holds that larceny consists in taking property belonging to some one else, even for a commendable purpose.

WAS VETERAN TAILOR.

J. M. Isham of Burlington Died Yesterday, Aged 78. Burlington, Feb. 27.—Jeremiah M. Isham, aged 78 years, a veteran tailor, died yesterday. He was born in Shelburne. He was a prominent mason, being Past Grand Master of the state, and also Old Fellow. He leaves a son and two daughters.
