February Weather.

Northfield, March 4.—Forecast: W. A. Shaw of the weather bureau reports a mean temperature for February of 49 degrees. This was the lowest for any February during the last 30 years for that period being 46 degrees. The maximum was 47 on the 14th. The precipitation (rain and melted snow) amounted to 7.1 inch, the average February precipitation being 2.14 inches. Eight inches of snow fell. The prevailing wind was from the north, and the average hourly velocity was 9.4 miles. The maximum velocity was 44 miles per hour from the northwest on the 20th. The month was made up of eight clear, nine partly cloudy and 11 cloudy days. Precipitation occurred on ten days. Auroras were noted on the 7th, 8th and 9th, solar halos on the 4th and 24th.

First Car to Run Over New Trolley Line

The first car over the new trolley line between Williamstown, Mass., and Pownal, which will be connecting link of an important electric service between Berkshire county, Mass., and the adjoining part of New York and Vermont, was run Wednesday afternoon, February 27. Superintendent Wheeler of the Berkshire street railway, Supt. W. T. Nary of the Williamstown division, and other officials were on board. The trip was made for the purpose of inspection. The line is still incomplete between Pownal and Bennington.
