

FEAR GALES WILL PREVENT SALVAGE WORK ON DAKOTA

Board of Underwriters' Surveyors Visit Scene of Wreck Again.

Yokohama, Mar. 8.—Representatives of the Underwriters' Board, who yesterday again visited the scene of the wreck of the Great Northern Steamship company's transpacific liner Dakota—which ran ashore in the bay of Tokio, March 3—report that salvage work is possible if time, weather and gear are adequate.

Fear is expressed, however, that the equinoctial gales and the remoteness of the wreck may preclude her salvage. Another and closer survey of the wreck will be made today.

A diver who visited the Dakota returned here yesterday afternoon. He says the vessel is in the greatest danger. She is resting on four rocks, her rudder is ten feet above the water, the foot of her second mast is on a level with the sea, she has three large holes in her port side, and there are smaller holes in her starboard side. In addition, parts of the sides are bent in. Apparently, she passed through a ride of rocks shaped like a vise, the upper parts of the rocks being turned in.

The Times' Daily Short Story.

The Man Who Murdered Himself.

(Original.)
One morning a man stepped into the office of the chief of police of Wendgate and said:

"A murder has been committed about a mile from this town. I saw the murderer rifle the body and come in this direction. I followed him and saw him go into a restaurant."

An officer was sent to where the murder had been committed to bring in the body. Another went with the former to the restaurant, where the murderer was found and arrested. He was taken to the police office, and the dead man soon arrived at the same place. An examination showed that the man had been killed by a blow from some iron or wooden substance. In the pockets was no money, but a pocketbook containing cards on which were printed the name Russell Rowe. The prisoner was searched, but no valuables or papers were found on him. He was a well dressed man of respectable appearance. The murdered man was quite the reverse. His clothes were shabby, and the body gave evidence that he drank.

When the prisoner was asked for his name, he gave it as Russell Rowe, the name on the cards in the dead man's pockets. The chief of police looked at him scrutinizingly, wondering what this statement would have to do with his line of defense. Then he asked the man for his story. It was this:

He had been walking along the road when he was overtaken by a man, who asked him for money. He was uncertain of the man's intentions and hoped to get off by giving him something. He took out his pocketbook, and the man caught sight of a large roll of bills.

After that the prisoner remembered nothing till he came to himself some time later. He was lying in the road, with a terrible pain in the back of his head. Feeling in his pockets, he found his money gone. With difficulty he arose and tottered on. He had gone but a short distance when he came upon a dead body, which he recognized at once as that of the man who had robbed him. He searched the clothes for his money, but, not finding it, went on to the town, where he could get a stimulant to brace him up. He was arrested while drinking a glass of whisky.

"That," said the chief, "is one of the most ingenious yarns I have ever heard from a criminal, but when you made it up you forgot one important part—the money he took from you."

The prisoner stuck to his story, and the indictment against him read that Russell Rowe was indicted for killing an unknown man, supposed to have been Russell Rowe, in other words, he was indicted for killing himself. He brought witnesses from a distant city, where he belonged, to identify him, but the prosecuting attorney badgered them so with questions as to whether they were perfectly certain and how they knew they were certain and whether they might not possibly be mistaken that they broke down and couldn't swear positively that the man was Russell Rowe, whom some of them had known for years.

The attorney for the defense got up a theory to account for the disappearance of the money, but there was nothing probable in it. Even if the disappearance were satisfactorily explained

there were the visiting cards to establish the identity of the real Russell Rowe. The attorney's explanation fell flat, being unsupported by the least evidence.

The prosecuting attorney in summing up explained the nature of circumstantial evidence to the jury—what would be weak, what strong, evidence. He reviewed the evidence against the prisoner. He had been discovered rifling the pockets. If he had found anything, it had been easy to get rid of it before his arrest. This proof he contrasted with the prisoner's improbable story. Thus he made it clear to the jury, and the judge charged them in accordance with the evidence. They were but half an hour bringing in a verdict of guilty.

Notwithstanding the plainness of the case there were some who felt that a mistake was being made. The prisoner's lawyer was in an agony at the result. He fought the case with delays, but they were of no avail. Nothing but new evidence could save the prisoner, and new evidence was not forthcoming. The prisoner was finally hanged, protesting his innocence of the crime and declaring that he was the man who had been murdered.

The Russell Rowe case, which had attracted much attention, had come to be a thing of the past and was gradually being forgotten except by Rowe's attorney and the chaplain who attended him in his last moments, who could never forget it. Years after the tragedy a man named Hardy was convicted of murder and robbery. Immediately before his execution he made a confession of another murder of which he had never been suspected. He and a man named James Skilling had been companions in crime. One day they saw a man display a large roll of bills. Afterward he started to walk to Windgate. They followed him, Hardy going around and ahead of him, Skilling behind him. Skilling came up with the man and did the job. When Skilling met Hardy he claimed there was no money in the case. Hardy did not believe him. They quarreled, and Hardy killed Skilling, took the money and went away, leaving the body in the road.

It is easy to complete the chain of events—Hardy took the money, leaving Russell Rowe's pocketbook and cards on the body.
