GROWTH IN IMPORTS

Seven Months' Figures Are Compared

MATERIALS ON INCREASE

More Than Fifty Per Cent of the Total Valuation—Decided Increase Is Shown in Nearly All Articles.

Washington, March 12.—Importations of manufacturers' materials continued to increase. In the seven months ending with January, 1907, raw materials for use in manufactures were imported to the value of \$262,000,000 against \$223,000,000 in the same months of last year, while manufactures for further use in manufacturing imported amounted to \$158,000,000 against \$129,000,000 in the corresponding period of last year. In fact, more than one-half of the importations at the present time is for use in manufacturing, crude materials forming 32.3 per cent of the total imports, and manufactures for further use in manufacturing 19.5 per cent. Thus 51.8 per cent of the entire importations in the seven months ending with January, 1907, may properly be classed as manufacturers' materials, and in the single month of January, 1907, the proportion which this class of materials formed of the total imports was 54 per cent.

In nearly all articles classed as manufacturers' materials the figures for the seven months ending with January, 1907, are larger than those for the corresponding months of the preceding year. Cement, for instance, show a total importation of 744,000,000 pounds, against 213,000,000 in the same months of last year.

PEER WHO BEAT QUARRYMEN AFTER 3 YEARS' STRIKE DEAD

Lord Penrhyn's Victory Cost His Men \$2,000,000 in Wages.

London, March 12.—Lord Penrhyn, whose dispute with his employees at the Bethesda slate quarries brought us into a great deal of prominence, is dead. When the quarries struck, Lord Penrhyn refused to parley with them in any shape or form, shut down the quarries, and refused to reopen them except on his own terms. The men yielded after a bitter three years' struggle, which cost the Bethesda district nearly \$2,000,000 in wages, and which, it is asserted, did no one any good except the foreign quarriesmen, who, as a result of the dispute, developed a thriving business in the way of sending slates to England. The late peer was born in 1836 and succeeded his father in 1886.

NO SUCH THING AS MIND READING.

Kellar, the Magician, Believes It Impossible.

Kellar, the famous magician, was questioned recently regarding his views in mind-reading and other apparently supernatural experiences. Mr. Kellar said: "There is no such thing as mind-reading. I have tried to read the minds of the crowd in search of hidden objects are based on the natural principle that a person cannot concentrate his or her mind on the location of the hidden object, keep in motion, and not go toward it. This sort of mind-reading is muscle-reading. Hypnotic trances were used in the 'principles' I do believe, however, in telepathy, as the manifestations of it are so numerous as to compel belief. But telepathy is involuntary. Aside from these involuntary expressions the mind is a castle in which no person may penetrate."

Unless he was to see this explanation no power could convince this man that I was merely an ordinary American."
