IN QUINCY GRANITE SHEDS.

In its report on sanitary conditions in factories and workshops in Massachusetts, the board of health of that state devotes a considerable portion to the granite industry. After stating the danger of inhaling the granite dust, the report goes on to tell of the various methods which are exercised by the workmen to prevent breathing in the dust. It says:

"The men who operate the surfacing tools rarely wear masks, but many chew tobacco and spit, in the belief that the practice serves to protect them from the effects of the dust to which they are exposed. Some protect themselves from

Bying chips by means of wire screens placed about the hammer; some wear wire masks and some wear glasses. By a union regulation, surfacing is done in the open sheds in the yard."

The report further states that the disease is the most prevalent in the cases of men between the ages of 40 and 50 years, and then comes out with this pointed statement, that "It is a well-established belief among those employed that it is the careless and those who indulge in alcoholic beverages who, as a class, are most likely to become infected."

Without reckoning the deaths due to accident, the percentage of deaths among Quincy granite cutters due to tuberculosis is 14.5. On top of this is the even more lugubrious assertion that "in a large number of the yards and sheds visited, a considerable proportion of the employees showed various evidences of impending or existing ill health." The only remedy which the Massachusetts board of health suggests is the use of "respirators," which aid to the maintenance of health, but which are generally declined because of the inconvenience which their use entails.

CONDITION OF MAIN STREET.

Team traveling on Main street has been, and is, attended by considerable danger, and serious accidents have been averted only by the extra precaution taken by drivers. The trouble is due to the piling up of snow beside the electric railroad track. After each storm it has been the practice of the trolley company to sweep the snow to one side and there leave it to constitute a hindrance and a menace, together with the accumulations from the sidewalks. Throughout the winter the track has formed a depression from one to two feet below the surface of the remainder of the street. This left opportunity for many accidents if the greatest care was not exercised in driving, as one could easily imagine, with one runner of the sledge slewing into the depression and the other runner balancing in the air. Another winter such a state of affairs should not be tolerated by the city. The electric railroad should be compelled to remove all the snow which it sweeps from its track. The justice of this requirement will appeal even to the railroad.

There is, moreover, a present duty on a section of the street which should be attended to, that is to remove these accumulations that are now in the form of ice. Dangerous as they were in the form of high banks of snow, they are doubly dangerous now on account of the slippery surface. The west side of Main street is in a slovenly state. The height of the buildings has prevented the action of the sun to a great extent on that half of the street, and the rains have left a rounding mound of ice, to balance on which takes skillful driving. Well-directed use of the axe will lessen the abruptness of the fall into the car track, and this should be attended to at once, before serious accident results. It is no more than fair that the railway company assist in undoing an evil for which its careless action earlier in the winter is partially responsible. And by the time that the snow of another winter begins to fall, the street requirement that the company remove all the snow which it gouges out of the street should be imposed.


