SAN FRANCISCO IS LOOTED

Bribery and Graft Galore Uncovered

ROBBED IN ALL DIRECTIONS

Abraham Ruef Was the Chief of the Plunderers—Acted as Agent for the Bribery of Municipal Officials.

San Francisco, March 22.—The indictments returned yesterday against the alleged municipal bribery followed the confession by Attorney Heney and detective Burns during the past week of ten days. The entering wedge was driven when Supervisors Loneragan and Boston were alleged to have been trapped several days ago by Heney and Burns in the act of taking a small bribe.

While neither Heney nor Langdon will admit that the supervisors were promised immunity from prosecution if they confessed, it is practically certain that they will not be proceeded against. In order to convict the bribe-givers who Heney and Burns declare are the actual criminals, it is apparent that no attempt will be made to prosecute the small fry if the latter will give such information as it may have.

Although twenty-seven indictments have so far been returned in connection with the alleged telephone graft, Burns asserted that the proving of the alleged graft had just begun. During the grand jury session yesterday afternoon, E. H. Zimmer and former auditor Sherwin of the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph company were closely questioned about affairs of the telephone company.

CANADA WILL NEVER JOIN US. No Union With America, Says McGill Professor.

Ottawa, March 22.—According to Professor Stephen Leacock of McGill university the United States will never annex Canada. In his book, "Greater Canada," he says: "Nor does our future lie in union with those that dwell on the southward; the day of annexation to the United States is past; they have chosen their lot and we have chosen ours. Let us our separate ways in peace, let them still keep their perennial Independence Day with its ruminating fire works and its 'Yankee Doodle.' We will keep our Magna Charta and our rough-and-ready 'Rule Britannia' shouting lustily."

CULLOM WOULD JAIL HARRIMAN

Senator From Illinois Declares the \$32,000,000

BOND ISSUE CRIMINAL

They Cannot Be Invalidated—Statements Made After Visit to the White House Where He Told the President the Financier Should Be Punished.

Washington, D. C., March 22.—"If I had my way I'd put E. H. Harriman in the penitentiary," declared Senator Cullom of Illinois, as he emerged from the White House yesterday. He added that he told the president that Harriman should be punished.

Senator Cullom explained that he believed Harriman deserved a term in prison for his methods of finance in connection with the Chicago and Alton, particularly in the issue of \$32,000,000.

Chicago and Alton bonds. He said the investors in these bonds, in his opinion, were certain to lose money on them, while Harriman reaped a rich profit. He was asked whether the state of Illinois would be able to invalidate the bonds.

As the author of the original interstate commerce law and one of the foremost men on the Senate interstate commerce committee, Senator Cullom's ideas as to what the next session of Congress may or ought to do are of interest.

"Should there be legislation to strengthen the rate law and give the federal government greater control over the roads?" he was asked. "Well, I believe Congress should go slow, and should see how the law as it now stands works out," he replied.

WHOLE TRAIN TUMBLES. DODD MOUNTAIN SIDE.

Engine Rolls Over Engineer, but No One Is Killed. Antonia, Col., March 22.—Eastbound Denver and Rio Grande passenger train no. 116, running between Durango and this place, left the track at a curve between Osier and Toltec gorge, thirty miles west of here, Wednesday night, and thirty-five passengers had a miraculous escape from death.

The engine and tender rolled down an embankment 200 feet to the bottom of a chasm. All the coaches left the track, several turning completely over, and the rest alighting on their sides.

96-HOUR BATTLE IN \$100,000 POKER GAME.

After Four Days and Nights of Steady Play, the Chicago Gamblers Adjourn, But to Begin Anew.

Chicago, Ill., March 22.—A sensational poker game, lasting through four consecutive days and nights, has been hurriedly adjourned from Magnet hotel, after more than \$100,000 has been won and lost.

Publicly drove to other quarters six participants in the greatest game ever known in Chicago, and the worn and pallid gamblers have resumed play. Four of the players had been continuously in their seats night and day since last Saturday, waging a battle of chips for high stakes.

A state senator, whose name is guarded, of whom Mont Tennes is said to be a heavy loser, he was said to have been one, and John Sullivan, better known as "Sully," another. Smoke of cigars still lingered when the outsiders reached the place. Broken wine glasses and cigarette stubs covered the partly deserted table.

The men hurried away in a cab at the first word that the game had gained wide attention, leaving a sleepy house-keeper on watch. Mrs. Mont Tennes declares she knows nothing about her husband's reported losses or the long game.

ASSASSINS AIDING CZAR Sensational Testimony in Court Concerning "League" OF THE RUSSIAN PEOPLE

To Terrorize the Legislature—Rates for "Removing" Representatives of the Masses Ranged from \$2 to \$1,500.

St. Petersburg, March 22.—Sensational testimony to the effect that the Reactionary League of the Russian People hired men to murder Ivan Patrunkevitch, the noted liberal member of the first parliament, and also contemplated the assassination of M. Raminchwill, an ex-member of Parliament, and M. Dzhabaridge, another member of the late legislature, in order to terrorize that body, has been given at the resumption in Finland of the trial of the murderers of Prof. Hertzenstein, the member of the lower house who was killed at his country home near Teroki, Finland, July 31 last.

The prosecution placed on the stand a soldier named Kriks, who had been a member of the Fighting Organization of the Reactionary party and who testified to receiving various sums of money from M. Yushkevitch, a leader of the League of the Russian People, in order to induce him to kill M. Patrunkevitch. The witness implicated Dr. Dubrovnik, president of the league, and M. Bulatov, a St. Petersburg lawyer of high social standing, whose aunt married one of the dukes of Oldenburg. He stated that M. Bulatov gave money to another soldier in order to induce him to murder M. Patrunkevitch, and also sent the man to Dr. Dubrovnik, who was so overjoyed that he kissed him on both cheeks.

Kriks described the organization of the Fighting Group of the Reactionary party and gave details of various crimes committed by the group. The witness also furnished a mass of hearsay evidence, detailing the murder of Prof. Hertzenstein and the plot to assassinate MM. Raminchwill and Dzhabaridge, saying that the prices paid for assassinations ranged from a couple of dollars for minor murders to \$1,500 for killing Prof. Hertzenstein.

The testimony was admitted by the court and the trial of the defendants was adjourned until April 10, during which period an attempt will be made to obtain the extradition of M. Yushkevitch, who with the chief participants in the Hertzenstein murder, fled to Roumania. The Terrorist organization of the Social Revolutionists has issued an announcement that eight political murders or attempts at assassination, were made by its order during the past two months, including the killing of the governor of Penza, who was murdered while leaving a theatre there on February 2, and the assassination of Gen. Kozlovsky, commander at Krasnoyarsk, Siberia, who was shot and killed July 27, and also giving particulars of several "executions" of non-commissioned officers of the army and navy for "interfering with the work of the military organization" of the Social-Revolutionists.

BAR JAPANESE IN TRANSVAAL. New Parliament Will Pass Ordinance, Keep Chinese From Mines.

Pretoria, Transvaal, March 22.—The first parliament of the Transvaal colony met yesterday in the hall in which the late President Kruger presided. The Earl of Selborne, high commissioner for South Africa, in his speech, dealt with Chinese labor as follows: "My ministers have resolved that the employment of Chinese in the mines shall cease at the earliest possible moment. Excepting a small batch of 407, whose indentures expire at the end of June, no indentures expire before August. Therefore, as Parliament will reassemble early in June my ministers consider it unnecessary to make further announcement of policy at present."

Lord Selborne added that the government was taking steps to increase the supply of natives and would give the mining industry every assistance. The assent ordinance, to exclude all Asiatics from work in the mines, will be re-enacted in spite of the opposition of the imperial government.
