LICENSE COMMISSIONERS FOR BARRE.

Court opinions are now forthcoming to show that complications similar to the one which has confronted Barre for two days have been dissolved without difficulty, and it seems that a board of license commissioners can be appointed for the city in spite of the fact that the sixteen days have elapsed, during which they shall be appointed, according to the law. As The Times understands the situation, there are two, possibly more, methods by which the result may be attained. One is by an order of the courts that the three commissioners be appointed under a writ of mandamus. The other is the more simple method at the outset, and that is for the assistant judges to proceed with the appointment of the three commissioners, notwithstanding that the sixteen days have passed. This latter course may lead to complications, but that is not probable in view of the opinions already handed down that bear directly on this case.

PRACTICAL OPPOSITION.

The cause of woman's suffrage in Rhode Island is met with practical objections, just as it is in Vermont, the opponents of it avoiding the question of the theoretical right of property-holding women to exercise the franchise. At a recent legislative hearing held in the former state, one, Mrs. Charles Warren Jappitt, argued against the extension of the suffrage to women on the ground that they haven't time in which to attend to political duties, which, to perform properly, requires more knowledge of the world, of men, and of affairs, than most voters now possess. Just why women should need to have a greater knowledge of the world, of men and of affairs than present voters have is not apparent. Given similar equipment, we would be willing to assert that women would be as capable of voting as are their male brethren. There may,

however, be something to the argument that women have not the time necessary to learn about the "world, men and affairs." In that they are seriously handicapped. As the Providence Bulletin says: "A few women without family ties have sufficient time to study political questions and to take part in caucuses and to investigate questions of city, state and national moment, and they are fully as able as their brothers to cast their ballots with discretion." But the vast majority are entirely without the proper equipment, and therefore the serious practical objection to their voting. There is of course the additional objection that only those few women now prepared really desire and ask for the ballot.


