## EARTHQUAKE AT BITLIS

### Seat of American Mission in Armenia

## MANY NATIVES KILLED

### Six Missionaries Homeless—Are Encamped in Snow; Weather Severe—Urgent Request for Aid; Outside Help Needed.

Constantinople, April 2.—The report that a severe earthquake, accompanied by loss of life, has occurred at Bitlis, is confirmed, but the number of deaths is unknown.  
A brief message from the missionaries at Bitlis states that the town is badly damaged, that they are homeless, and that their people are encamped in the snow.  
London, April 2.—The situation of Bitlis, which is built on a rocky slope, with houses constructed of stone, having list, earthen roofs, causes people here to fear that a great amount of damage has been done. It is described as a picturesque, densely populated town, having but few Europeans among the population. A British vice-consul is stationed there, but at present he is absent on leave.  
Instructions have already been sent to the local authorities to afford relief to the inhabitants, but there is no doubt that outside help is needed.

Bitlis, or Beldis, is a town of Turkish Armenia, capital of the vilayet of the same name, sixty-two miles west of Van, near Lake Van, and more than 5,000 feet above the level of the sea. The town is irregularly built, but contains many stone houses, giving it the appearance of a European city. It consists of a mission station of the American board, with several missionaries and a number of mission schools. The population, which numbers about 25,000, consists mainly of Kurds, Armenians and Turks.

## PRINCE TO SAIL FOR HARVARD NEXT FALL

### Will Come With Military Secretary, Says London Daily Mail—Choice Due to the Monroe Doctrine Stand.

London, April 2.—Two of Emperor William's sons are to be educated by Americans.  
It is probable that Prince Oscar, Emperor William's fifth son, will go to America with a military adjutant in time for the opening of the next college year at Harvard in September, says a Berlin despatch to the Daily Mail.  
Two facts determined the emperor in choosing Harvard. First, it is the alma mater of President Roosevelt, and Ambassador Towner, who are extremely popular at the German court; and, secondly, it is the American university which specializes in German subjects. Harvard is, further, the seat of that small American cult which opposes the Monroe doctrine.  
Prince August William, the Kaiser's fourth son, will have a special course of ten lectures on the history of the American constitution given for him by Prof. Burgess, dean of the Columbia college, at the university of Bonn. A select class of other students will also hear these lectures.

## BIG RECEPTION FOR TAFT.

### Governor Winthrop Making Preparations at Porto Rico.

San Juan, P. R., April 2.—Governor Winthrop is preparing to make the reception in Porto Rico of Secretary of War Taft second only to that extended to President Roosevelt. Mrs. Taft will precede the secretary to this island, arriving here April 11. The present program includes an informal dinner on Secretary Taft's arrival here April 14, a visit to points of historic interest and an automobile trip from San Juan to Ponce and return, over the same roads taken by President Roosevelt.

## FINE SHERIFF FOR BEING ARMED.

### An Odd Decision, Given by a Court in Georgia.

Columbia, S. C., April 2.—Sheriff Rabon of Aiken county, this state, was arrested in Jefferson county, Ga., charged with carrying a pistol. He was convicted, the sentence being \$20 fine or four months on the chain gang. The South Carolina official was armed, with revolvers, papers from Governor Terrell and was endeavoring to arrest a fugitive from this state. The matter has just come to light.

## BISHOP DROPS DEAD.

### J. C. Granbery Dies in the Street in Ashland.

Richmond, Va., April 2.—Bishop John C. Granbery of the Methodist church in South, dropped dead in the street at Ashland yesterday morning. He went to the postoffice to get his mail and was returning home. He was 70 years old, and was made a bishop in 1882.

## THIS WOMAN A GERM FACTORY.

### New York Doctors Find That Although Well She Breeds Typhoid.

New York, April 2.—A puzzling case is under observation in the Reception hospital in this city. The patient is a woman, a cook, apparently in perfect health, but who is detained because she is suspected of having communicated typhoid to about 25 persons within the past six years.  
According to Dr. Walter Benzel, the sanitary superintendent of Manhattan, the woman is literally a living "typhoid factory." She herself was stricken with the disease about six years ago.

Now it is found that in all the time since she was declared cured of typhoid she has kept on nurturing and developing the typhoid germs. Though herself immune, the germs which she has been developing have been a source of danger to all with whom she has come in contact.

"The Lord only knows what we can do with the woman," said Dr. Benzel. "We will employ every means known to science to locate and destroy the culture group of germs which persist in lingering in her anatomy."  
Suspicion was attracted to the woman as typhoid invariably appeared in families where she was employed, and when she was taken to the hospital the suspicion was confirmed.  
Dr. Darlington, the health commissioner, says there is considerable doubt as to the legal right of the health officials to detain the German woman. She has violated no laws. Science, however, regards her as an unconscious menace to the community.

## COUPLE MINUS COIN ON TRAMP.

### Mr. and Mrs. Fred Brown, Stranded in Lowell, Walking to Detroit.

Vassar, Mich., April 2.—After being stranded at Lowell, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Brown of Toronto started on a long tramp to Detroit. They arrived here tired and hungry. Mrs. Brown's shoes were worn away.  
Brown said they were traveling with a moving picture show, starting out from South Bend, Ind. Mrs. Brown's sister was with them, as was also their three-year-old baby. At Lowell, near Grand Rapids, the man in charge of the show disappeared.


