

CARNEGIE INSTITUTE OPEN

Guests Welcomed By Head of Trustees.

RECEPTION BY THE MAYOR

Many Distinguished Foreigners Were Present—A Description of the Magnificent Building at Pittsburgh.

Pittsburgh, Pa., April 12.—Without any change in the official programme the first day's proceedings in connection with the dedication of the palatial Carnegie Institute of Pittsburgh were enacted in the presence of the most distinguished audience of European and American dignitaries ever assembled in this city.

The first ceremonies in connection with the dedication, which will extend over three days, began at 9:45 o'clock when William N. Frew, president of the board of trustees, welcomed the invited guests from England, Germany, France, Belgium, Holland, South America, Canada and the United States in the founder's room of the institute. The meeting was an informal one. Immediately following this, Mayor George W. Guthrie of Pittsburgh and Mrs. Guthrie held a municipal reception in the foyer. They were assisted by Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Carnegie.

At the close of the reception the museum and galleries of fine art, including the international annual exhibition of paintings, were inspected. The tour of

inspection gave the visitors the first complete view of the institute buildings. Following the noon recess the formal dedication exercises were held. The guests marched from the Hotel Schenley to the institute, the exercises taking place in the musical hall.

THE CARNEGIE INSTITUTE.

Construction Has Required Thirty Months; It Has Cost \$6,000,000.

The modern temple dedicated to literature, art, music and science, rises a glistening edifice of marble from the greenward of Schenley park, one of the most beautiful in the park system of the city. Located on Forbes street near the Grant boulevard, the building faces the south, and with its wings and extensions covers an area of four acres, with the three floors there is a space for the various departments of sixteen acres, exclusive of two basements and the power house. The total cost of the institute, which occupied thirty months in construction, was \$6,000,000. There is no woodwork in the whole building. Twenty-five thousand electric lights and two hundred miles of wiring are controlled by one of the largest switchboards in the world. In the library the new book-stacks are eleven stories high and have a capacity of 800,000 volumes, while the entire capacity is 1,500,000 volumes. The art galleries cover 44,700 square feet, and the museum 104,000 feet.

MAN WITH OPEN KNIFE TRIES TO SEE CARNEGIE.

But He Only Wants to Open His Eyes to Wonders of New Invention.

Pittsburgh, April 12.—While the dedicatory ceremonies were in progress in the Carnegie Institute, Frederick Slagel, an alleged anarchist, tried to force his way into the lobby of the hotel Schenley, a block away and was promptly taken into custody. An open pen-knife was found concealed under the man's cuff. Slagel gave his age as thirty-five years and residence as Los Angeles, Cal. He talked incoherently, but the police finally discovered that

Slagel wished to speak with Andrew Carnegie regarding a patent for making cows.

Every possible effort to avoid such occurrences have been taken by the police. Over two hundred uniformed officers are on the ground in addition to many detectives.

ON TRAIL OF NEW GRAFT

Ballot-Box Stuffing Inquiry in San Francisco.

CHARGES AGAINST HEARST

Agents Under Investigation — Supreme Court Gives Ruff More Liberty—He May Consult Attorneys Out of Guards' Hearing.

San Francisco, April 12.—Inquiry by the grand jury into the alleged ballot-box stuffing by agents of William R. Hearst, and into the telephone franchise corruption, and a decision by the supreme court increasing the personal liberty of Abraham Ruff, were the net results of Wednesday's procedure in the municipal "graft" investigation. The grand jury took up the charge recently published to the effect that Edward Graney, a prize-fight promoter and ward politician, had, as was alleged, confessed to special agent Burns that he had, in August, 1904, caused primary ballot boxes to be stuffed at an expense of \$200, furnishing it is said by J. P. Barrett, and at the alleged order of Barrett, news editor of the San Francisco Examiner. A number of witnesses denied unequivocally before the grand jury the charges comprised in Graney's alleged confession or any knowledge bearing upon them.

The supreme court has instructed that henceforth Elmer Riggs shall permit

Abraham Ruff to see, within reasonable hours, any person whom he desires to see and to talk with his attorneys, his witnesses, the members of his family and other persons with whom he has business outside the hearing of his guards.
