D. 1907, have by resolution duly passed, decided that the public good and the convenience and necessity of individuals required that that portion of North Main street extending from its beginning at the intersection of Prospect street near the Universalist church and City Hall in a northerly direction to a point opposite the Miles granite building, so-called, situated on said street, should have been drained, paved, graded, curbed and guttered, and that said improvements of draining, paving, grading, curbing and guttering, when made in the year 1905 were for the public good, convenience and necessity of individuals and that the public good and convenience and necessity of individuals required the same to be made as they were made and have ordered the street commissioners to give notice thereof to you, hold a hearing and to proceed according to the charter and ordinances of the city of Barre, Vermont, and the laws of this state, and that we, said street commissioners, have complied with said order of said council, and the charter, ordinances and statutes in such case provided.

Therefore, you are notified that we, the undersigned street commissioners of said city of Barre, have appointed the 6th day of May, A. D. 1907, at 4 o'clock in the afternoon at the city council chamber in the City Hall, in said city of Barre, Vermont, as the time and place for hearing you, and each of you and all parties interested, upon the amount if anything that shall be assessed upon the lands and buildings fronting or adjacent to said North Main street for the paving, draining, grading, curbing and guttering the said portion of said North Main street, so called, as provided by the charter and ordinances of the city of Barre and the laws of this state.

PRIZE POTATOES.


Excellent Quality of Tubers Grown Under Straw. The accompanying illustration is from a photograph made at the 1906 Illinois state fair, and the potatoes shown are prize winning samples from my collection of forty-five varieties grown that were shown at the state fair last fall. I was awarded first prize for best and largest collection and also took fifteen first prizes on single exhibits out of a list of seventeen.

Banner, Burpee's Eureka, Early Ohio, World's Fair and Snowflake. Last year was an exceptionally good year for potatoes grown under straw. The tubers are smoother and more uniformly large and of better quality than I have seen for years. I think the farmers of St. Clair county grow more potatoes under straw than any other county in the state and perhaps in the United States. Thousands of bushels of these potatoes are shipped from Belleville to other points in the county and to the St. Louis market. Hundreds of bushels are also peddled out to private customers. The keeping and eating qualities of my potatoes grown under straw are excellent.—S. M. Ripley in New England Homestead.

Swiss Chard and Endive. Swiss chard is nothing more nor less than a beet having thrifty, rather curly handsome foliage. The large white middle rib of the leaf is sometimes cooked like asparagus, the rest of the leaf like spinach. Its culture is simple. Sow seed as for beets in spring, thin to six or eight inches apart and give clean cultivation. Chard and spinach are especially benefited by light dressings of nitrate of soda. Spinach for earliest spring use should be sown in autumn and the plants lightly mulched during winter. Have the rows a foot apart and plants about three inches apart in the rows. For summer use sow in early spring, just as soon as ground is in working order, and again later for succession. Cultivate freely and keep free from weeds. Endive makes an excellent fall salad and grows well in hot weather. Sow seed in June or July in rows one foot apart, leaving plants about eight inches apart in the row.



Transparent Apple Tree. This transparent apple tree in eight years old. It is a part of the Montana experiment station's young orchard. The foliage is thrifty, and the tree near Bonanza has every appearance of being hardy, says Orange Judd Farmer. It comes into bearing rapidly. Transparent apples are highly prized as autumn table fruit.

more milk every day, never less. If a cow is permitted to partially dry off, it is next to impossible to bring her back to her normal milking capacity during the lactation period. It is not desirable that new milk cows should be forced, but it is essential for profits that they be handled with great care.—Farm Press.

Sugar Corn and Peas. Now, friends, do have plenty of sugar corn and peas. Plant both at least twice a month for succession. And don't forget plenty of lima beans. Why? we nearly live on these things for three months of the year! Begin planting peas now, beans and corn next month.—Farm Journal.

In the Garden. Lettuce plants wintered in cold frames should be hardened off for planting out. Plants from hotbeds should be transferred to cold frames when ready. A good wheel hoe is a handy tool to have in a garden; also a seed drill. But don't think that old fashioned elbow grease, hoe, rake, etc., can be dispensed with. Asparagus can be grown without salt, but many gardeners prefer to use it. Sprinkled on the bed, it helps to keep down weeds and perhaps adds to the flavor of the shoots.—Farm Journal.

Fruiting Too Early. It is generally conceded poor policy to allow strawberry plants set in the spring to bear fruit the following summer, says American Agriculturist. Allowing them to fruit will weaken the plants by pollen exhaustion and seed production and perhaps result in killing them. All newly set strawberry plants should be relieved of their buds and blossoms just as soon as they appear. Pinch or cut them off. It pays to do it.

The Hessian Fly. In the pupa state the Hessian fly can scarcely be distinguished from a fly-egg.

Breastworks. Toward the close of the civil war the men on both sides became so expert in erecting temporary fortifications that in a few minutes an entire regiment, halted in an open field, would disappear from view behind the breastworks thrown up by the men.
