MORE PAY FOR TROLLEY MEN
Rhode Island Company Announce In-
crease.

Providence, R. I., April 25.—Announce-
ment of a ten per cent increase in wages
on a basis of a ten-hour day, to go into
effect on Sunday next, was made yester-
day by the management of the Rhode
Island trolley company, the corporation that
operates practically all the street rail-
way lines in the state. This increase
will be shared by 615 motormen and 595
conductors. In explaining the increase,
which was not asked for by the em-
ployees, General Manager A. E. Fetter
said: "The raise is granted the men
without any request having been made
by them and would indicate that the
railway management is able to deal more
liberally with its employees where no
unions exist, for the reason that it is
not obliged to hold back something at
all times as a matter of trade."

FIVE-CENT FARE TO CONEY.
Bill Is Passed by the New York As-
sembly.

Albany, N. Y., April 25.—By a vote of
97 to 5, the assembly yesterday passed
a bill which is designed to provide a
five-cent rate from New York to Coney
Island.

MORE ARRESTS
IN BOND CASE

Dennett Held in \$10,000 in
New York

DETECTIVES GUARD OFFICE

Woman Stenographer Denies She Is
"Reardon," the Mysterious Partner
—Boston Lawyer Is Sought
For.

New York, April 25.—Oliver M. Den-
nett, the Boston banker and broker ar-
rested Tuesday, was held in \$10,000 bail
for trial in police court yesterday on the
charge of receiving stolen property.

Dennett was taken in connection with
the theft from the Trust company of
America of bonds of the Chicago, Rock
Island & Pacific railroad, valued at \$50,
000, by W. O. Douglas, assistant loan
clerk. Douglas also is in custody.

The police tried yesterday to induce
Dennett to disclose the details of the
transaction, but when the police attempt-
ed to put the broker through a search-
ing examination, Dennett declined to
answer any questions, declaring that he
was acting on the advice of his counsel.

CLEVELAND APPROVES
REUNION AT JAMESTOWN.

Descendants of Signers of Declaration
of Independence Should Get
Together.

Washington, April 25.—The Thomas
Jefferson Memorial association of the
United States has made public a letter
from former President Grover Cleveland
"unreservedly approving" the plan for
the reunion of the descendants of the
signers of the Declaration of Independ-
ence at the Jamestown Exposition July 4.

Mr. Cleveland says:
"It seems to me that a reunion of the
descendants of the signers of the Declara-
tion of Independence on or about the
date when this immortal document was
signed would be a most impressive in-
cident in connection with the Jamestown
Exposition.

Such a reunion should certainly have
a tendency to stimulate patriotic senti-
ment and arouse among those who are
within its influence a better appreciation
of the initial efforts of the fathers of
the republic to establish a new nation
and impress upon it the best ideals of a
free government."

FINANCIAL NOTES.

The Indian government derives a
yearly income of \$30,000,000 from its
tax on opium.

In the seven years which have elapsed
since the adoption of the national
bank act of 1900 3,357 national banks
have been chartered, their authorized
capital stock amounting to \$194,831,
300.

At present German capitalists have
loans in Turkish securities amounting
to about \$60,000,000, invested chiefly in
fisheries, railways and armaments,
drawing interest at the rate of 4 and 5
per cent. The railways in which Ger-
many is interested are the Anatolian
and Bagdad.

WOMAN'S REALM.

Twenty-six women have just been
graduated from the law school of the
University of New York.

A petition for equal suffrage, signed
by 142,128 women, has been presented
to the Swedish parliament.

The city officers elected at Steam-
boat Springs, Colo., April 2, were nomi-
nated by the woman's club of that
city, and both Republicans and Democ-
rats endorsed the ticket.

Women physicians are employed in
the state hospitals at Toledo, Cleveland
and Dayton and the institution for epi-
leptics at Gallipolis, O. These ap-
pointments are made by the governor.

WALL STREET
"CANNIBALS"

Gulp Souls, Says Lecturer
to Hearers

WALL ST. IS "REAL THING"

Explorer Gail Extols Fiji as Compared
to More Modern Cannibalism
Which Eats Whole
Legislatures.

Detroit, Mich., April 25.—Telling
stories of the atrocities committed by the
Samoans and Fijians of a few years ago—
such, for instance, as the tale of a Fiji
king who delighted to slay his subjects
in order that he might feast on their
brains, and ate portions of no less than
a thousand beings before he became con-
verted to Christianity—William Edgar
Gail, explorer and lecturer, told a
church full of people in Detroit that
there is still something to be said for
barbarian cannibalism in comparison
with the cannibalism of Wall Street.

"You've got the real thing in New
York's Wall street. What's the differ-
ence between a cannibal of New Guinea
and one in Wall Street? Only in the
fact that the former eats his dish in the
deepest of darkness and relishes his
meals by mouthfuls, and the latter by
swallowing whole legislatures and men's
souls at a single gulp in the brightest
of lights. Modern commerce has de-
graded every class with which it has
come in contact."

PRESIDENT TUTTLE
EXPLAINS RATES

Appears at a Meeting of the Lumber-
men's Association at Manchester.

Manchester, N. H., April 25.—Presi-
dent Tuttle of the Boston & Maine rail-
road yesterday declared to 150 mem-
bers of the New Hampshire Lumber-
men's association that they had no valid
claims against the road for its increase
in freight rates two years ago.

The association, which met at the
Hotel Manchester, was organized for
protection against higher charges for
lumber shipments, with a plan to bring
suit. The members charge that the
road was contrary to the road's charter.

President Tuttle yesterday asserted
that the road was making no extra
profits, and that the \$200,000 raise in
freight rates given employees since would
more than offset the higher rates.

NEWS TO CANNON.

Says He Knows Nothing of Fairbanks Deal.

Washington, April 25.—Speaker Can-
non, who arrived here yesterday from
the west, was very much surprised to
learn of the report that he had made an
agreement to deliver the Illinois dele-
gation to the next republican conven-
tion to Vice-President Fairbanks. He
said:
"The first I knew of such a meeting
was on my journey to Washington this
morning, when I received the Wash-
ington papers. I do not know what
enterprising correspondents wrote and
sent that dispatch. I believe, however,
that some had orders during this dull
season to furnish something for the
papers. No such conference was held
in thought of at any time. Our people
in Illinois are exceedingly busy attend-
ing to the ordinary affairs of life. It
would be a bold man who would agree
to deliver the Illinois delegation to
anybody. I might further add that on
my way east to attend the Jamestown
exposition, I was detained at Indian-
apolis for a few hours, and as has been
my habit for many years, I called upon
the vice-president. It has been his
habit for many years when in Danville,
to call upon me."

COOMBS GETS
EVEN AGAIN

Held Boston in the Hoop of
His Hand Yesterday

ALLOWED BUT FIVE HITS

Philadelphia Won by the Score of Six to
One, Cy Young Being Touched Up
for Eight Hits, Including a
Home and Two Singles.

Boston, April 25.—Before a small at-
tendance the Huff crowd lost to the Phil-
adelphia Athletics yesterday afternoon
by the score of 6 to 1, the defeat being
mainly due to the fine pitching of
Coombs, who allowed the Bostonians only
five hits. The veteran Young was in
the box for Boston and was touched up
for eight hits. Two passes by Young
also figured in his team's discomfiture.
Coombs was more lucky in his two gifts
of bases on balls.

Boston was the first to break the ice
in the fourth and the ice closed up for
them immediately after they had tallied
once. Collins slashed out a single and
went to second on England's sacrifice.
Hoey singled over second and Collins
went to third, from which sock he scored
when Murphy threw wild to Davis after
Hoey had been forced at second. Parent
who was thus given a life at first was
then put out trying to steal.

The Athletics opened up savagely on
Young in the next inning. Davis tripped
and Murphy drove a hot one that
neither England nor Ferris could
get. Davis going in. Murphy went to
second on Schreck's out and completed
the circuit when Knight singled. Young
squeaked in a wild pitch and put Knight
on third, from which place he tried the
sneaky play with Lord at the bat. But
Lord fanned and Knight had to go back.
Immediately afterwards Lord fanned
and Hoey got Coombs' fly.

A pass to Hartel, a sacrifice by Cross
and Seybold's single gave the visitors
the victor's third run in the next inning,
and the other three came in the ninth inning
like this. Cross started with a triple
and Seybold then walked to first, fol-
lowed by Davis, who slammed a home
run over the right field fence, scoring
three.

OVERCOME BY FUMES
ON BURNING CRAFT

Gotham Firemen Have Hard Fight on a
Flame Swept Chemical Laden Boat.

New York, April 25.—The harbor fire-
men had a hard fight yesterday with a
fire which destroyed the freight steamer
Pioneer and caused a loss of \$75,000.
The Pioneer had many carboys of acid
and cylinders of carbonic acid gas in
her cargo.

The fire swept through her so quick-
ly that when the fireboat arrived she
was enveloped in flames. The flames
made it difficult for the firemen to
approach the blaze. They worked in
relays, but even then several of them
were overcome.

SMOKESTACK CRUSHES THREE WOMEN.

Bridgeton, N. J., April 25.—Two young
women were crushed to death here yester-
day by the falling of a smokestack
and a third was fatally injured.

HOPE FOR IRISH COUNCIL BILL

It May Be Introduced Early in May.

London, April 25.—The spirit of com-
promise is having effect on the prospects
of the Irish council bill, and its sup-
porters are more hopeful of reconciling
the differences regarding the terms of
the proposed measure. The outlook has
so far improved that Mr. Birrell, chief
secretary for Ireland, was able to an-
nounce in the House of Commons yester-
day that he hoped to be able to intro-
duce the bill May 7.

MOVE IN COMMONS ON YANKEE PACKERS.

London, April 25.—There was an at-
tempt in the House of Commons yester-
day to revive the agitation against the
American packing houses. Lloyd George
said bill had been introduced dealing
with the importation and preparation of
food. Mr. Lloyd George added: "I
am not aware that there is any cause
for further action."
