### AUTO RACED WITH TRAIN

Woman is Killed, Another May Die

CAR PLUNGED INTO SWAMP

At 85-Mile Gait and the Women Were Hurled Headlong, One of the Women Being Killed Instantly.

New York, May 9.—Speeding along Ocean driveway at Asbury park, a big racing car, in which were two women, swerved and pitched into the swamp. They were racing an express train and making 55 miles an hour. The women were hurled headlong, one being killed instantly, and the other receiving injuries that are expected to prove fatal.  
The dead woman was Miss Awilda Mass of Point Pleasant. The injured woman is Mrs. G. W. Boyce, wife of a wealthy automobile dealer in this city. Mrs. Boyce was at the lever.  
Every passenger on the express was watching the race toward Asbury park. Cheers after cheers went up as it was seen that the car was slowly gaining on the express. Suddenly the passengers noticed that the car did not seem to be well under control. A cry of alarm came from the two women and the next instant the car had plunged over an embankment.  
The engineer stopped his train and the passengers rushed to the rescue of the women. Miss Mass was found under part of the wreckage of the car.

THOUSANDS OF ACRES FLOODED.  
Situation Becoming Serious in Addison County Towns.

Middlebury, May 9.—The continued rains in this section, during the past few days have made the high water situation worse than ever. All the streams in this section are swollen bank full. Report from the neighboring town show that thousands of acres of land are submerged and the farmers are becoming discouraged over the outlook for the spring's work.

WOULD BAIL DE RYDER.  
Bridport Also Will Be Made at Brattleboro to Have Verdict Set Aside.

Brattleboro, May 9.—An effort will be made to secure bail for Dr. J. M. Ryder of Bellows Falls, who was convicted Tuesday night of attempting to perform an operation upon Miss Iva Martin of Proctorsville, resulting in her death October 30. Meanwhile Dr. Ryder is confined in jail in Newfane. His bail, which was \$2,000 before the trial is now \$7,000. Court will reconvene May 21, when a motion will be made by the respondent's counsel to have the verdict set aside as being against the evidence. In case the motion is denied sentence will be pronounced and the case will go to the supreme court on exceptions.

Epidemic of Measles at Bridport.  
Middlebury, May 9.—Within the past two weeks twenty-six houses in Bridport have been quarantined owing to an epidemic of measles. The schools have been closed for some time and religious services have only been held at infrequent intervals.


