Renewal of Orchards.
Renewal of orchards may profitably be accompanied by the addition of stable manure, either worked into the soil beneath the extremities of the branches or allowed to remain upon the surface to be covered later with straw or other coarse material applied as a mulch. The combination of renewal and fertilization will work wonders in the rejuvenation of many old orchards long considered unprofitable and valueless. —P. H. Ballou.

Alfalfa Meal.
It is merely ground alfalfa hay. It is recommended by the makers as a substitute for bran. There seems to be no reason why it should be any more digestible than the hay from which it is made. It may possibly be less digestible than average hay on account of there being so great a temptation to grind the poorer grades of hay. It forms a part of many of the so called dairy and stock feeds.—T. I. Mairs.
