The abject humiliation and contrition of the Congregationalist minister who married the W. E. This follows the previous statement by the minister that he believed the marriage was "made in Heaven" while Corey's other marriage was made on earth.

It has been demonstrated time and again, and it was demonstrated again in Montpelier this week, that there is not a city or town in the state so well equipped with hotels that it can cope with all emergencies. Late visitors to Montpelier Thursday night had to sleep in chairs. Yet people are nervous about going into the business of building new hotels. It must be admitted, in substantiation of their fears, that these crushes of people are infrequent and that during the winter season the hotel keepers have to mull along on small fodder. Of the half-dozen or so cities and towns in the state which claim the best hotel accommodations, no one can claim superiority.

On the married women teacher question which has caused some talk in Barre the Huntington Banner says: "The action of the Barre school board in turning out all the married teachers in the public schools there is more drastic than the occasion required though the principle is correct. Better a rule requiring young women/teachers to resign when they marry and in engaging new teachers to hire only spinsters. As a rule when a young woman, whether teacher or employed in other work, marries and accepts the responsibility of a home she loses, to a marked degree her sense of responsibility in her work. This is, of course, not always the case but often enough so that any large employer of women labor will say that young married women are the least desirable as employees of any class of females."

ERRORS IN JUDGMENT.

From the nature of their position police officers and other guardians of the peace are oftentimes placed in emergencies where prompt action and a clear discernment are necessary. They have to use their judgment in many instances as to whether or not the law is being broken, and in consequence are themselves not immune to arrest if they should charge a person falsely, and even if they were acting in good faith. So from the standpoint of their own liability in cases of false arrest they are required to use careful judgment.

There is, however, a moral responsibility assumed when they take up the duties of the position, that is of the more consequence. It is as protectors

of the rights of society, to preserve the integrity of the laws and to uphold a measure of the law's dignity. In this also the exercise of a brain capacity is needed. The officer must determine in emergencies to what extent he is warranted in going to maintain the dignity and uphold the integrity of the law. Occasionally officers show a useful incapacity in emergencies. The head of the Rockland, Maine, police, for example, showed that incapacity yesterday when he shot a man who was fleeing from arrest for failure to pay a one dollar dog license. The officer's statement that he shot higher than he intended to do, and the bullet penetrated the back rather than the leg, does not exculpate him from blame. More than that, it only adds to the gravity of his position, now under arrest, by displaying his utter incapacity for the position. Had the fleeing man been a murderer the officer might have been justified in shooting him, but for the petty offense of failure to pay one dollar for a dog license he was not justified in using that extreme measure. His lack of judgment in this instance stamps him as incapable of acting in the responsible position to which he was chosen, let alone the liability for shooting a man.

In the dots or figures the rim or outline varies in width in some, and in others the sizes increase, but no difference is being shown in color.

Cotton voiles make charmingly fresh looking gowns both in all white and in the striped patterns of delicate colors. Blue and white, pink and white and green and white are so decorative that they almost trim themselves.

White frocks with touches of delicate coloring in their finish are most used, but any becoming color is suitable for graduation gowns.

The essential point is to choose a model that is suitable and to see that the details of the toilet are carefully matched up. Shoes, hosiery, sash, gloves, etc., in perfect accord and of nice quality make an unpretentious gown smart, while the smartest frock is spoiled by ill-matched accessories.

The square Dutch neck is popular for girls with well rounded throats, and the others wear it nicely by filling the opening with lace or mull.

Embroidered and spotted muslins are again very much to the fore, and these make up prettily with very little trimming.
