

There are about 80 telephones of the People's line in the town of Strafford and the number is constantly increasing. There are four New England telephones in town. But for the narrow, greedy policy of the New England Telephone Co., it might have had and held the field. In this section its phones are now rented for \$12 a year and in some towns for \$10 and with a wider radius for patrons than formerly, when the prices were double what they are to-day. The price of a rented phone on the People's line averages \$10 a year. If the patron owns his phone and half a mile of line, as the majority of the patrons do, the cost is \$3 a year, with a wide circuit for telephoning without extra cost to all patrons.


