ALL SCORING LATE IN GAME

Rangers Defeated Northfield at Foot Ball, 3 to 2

AN INTERESTING MATCH

There Was No Scoring Until Latter Part of Second Half—Fraser the Visitors' Center Forward, Shot Both Goals Made By His Side.

The Rangers' field was the scene of an interesting association foot ball game Saturday afternoon in which the Rangers defeated the Northfield team by a score of 3 to 2.

Perhaps the first organized benefit for a particular favorite, however, was that given to Mrs. Barry in 1887. On such occasions it was customary to charge for admission to the stage, which in consequence often became so thronged that when a player to whom the distinction was accorded had to make his appearance before the footlights to take up his part in the piece it had not infrequently to be stopped for several minutes while the attendants forced a passage for the unfortunate actor through the throng of his admirers.

Thus on the occasion of Quin's benefit at Covent Garden, in 1753, the old actor, who was incumbered with the heavy dress of Falstaff, was several minutes before he could pass on to the stage on account of the crowds that were assembled in the wings.

Perhaps one of the saddest of the many benefits which have been celebrated at Drury Lane was that given on June 27, 1828, for Grimaldi, the greatest clown the stage has known, when the heartbroken old man was wheeled on to the stage in an armchair and hopelessly broke down in his endeavor to sing his once famous ditty, "Hot Colic."

A BATTLE IN CHINA.

Canton, June 17.—Reports from Wei-Chou state that two regiments of Chinese troops recently engaged the insurgents at Patsatan, with the result that the latter were compelled to retreat across the East river and later were dispersed. The regular troops lost one officer and 28 soldiers killed and had a number of wounded.

It has green wings, and is attractive to merchants in the big cities just as it is attractive to you. If you would catch these pretty butterflies that are circulating around home, you must use the net that circulates around home. Could anything be plainer?
