WINDSOR COUNTY COURT.
Settlement of Cases Caused Delay—Suit
Over Validity of Tax.

Woodstock, June 27.—The settlement
of three cases set in their order on the
docket of Windsor county court for trial
when court re-assembled Monday, left
the court without business until Tues-
day afternoon, when the case of Honer
N. Peor vs. Dan D. Howe was taken up
and a jury empaneled. The case is an
action of trover to recover the value
of several tons of hay alleged to have
been converted by the defendant to his
own use. The defendant lived on prem-
ises rented of the plaintiff, who had
stored the hay in the barn for removal
later. The defense is that the hay was
bought and paid for by the defendant.
The parties reside at Woodstock. Gil-
bert A. Davis appears for the plaintiff
and John G. Sargent for the defendant.
The case went to the jury yesterday
morning.

The net case taken up was that of
John C. Coolidge vs. Warren R. Taylor,
involving the validity of a certain tax
levied against the defendant by the
town of Plymouth, of which town the
plaintiff is constable. The case is on
trial and will take until Thursday.
Stokely, Sargent and Skeels appear for
the plaintiff and Gilbert A. Davis for the
defendant.

There are four or five cases still left
for trial on the civil list. Next week
the state cases will have the right of
way. There are three or four to be
tried.

TO VOTE ON CONSTITUTION.
Oklahoma Supreme Court Ends In-
junction.

Ottawa, Ok., June 27.—The Oklahoma
supreme court yesterday afternoon dis-
solved the injunction issued by district
Judge Pancoast restraining the constitu-
tional convention from submitting to a
vote of the people the constitution
drafted for the proposed new state of
Oklahoma. William H. Mubray, presi-
dent of the constitutional convention,
yesterday issued notice to the delegates
that the convention will reconvene on
July 10 to make changes in the elec-
tion ordinance.

Weather Forecast for Coming Quarter
A. A. Davis of Burlington makes the
following weather forecast from June 20
to September 20:
"The prevailing atmospheric currents
will come from the south for the lower,
and west for upper. There will be light
precipitation from the clouds coming
from the south, except when they are
met with showers from the west or
northwest. In the case we are liable
to have heavy dewspouts, or cloud
bursts, as they are called. The tempera-
ture will be high most of the time. The

about an average, if we do our part well."
