

BAD EIGHTH FOR WHERRY

Plattsburg Landed on Him in That Inning

ALSO ON FRASER IN NINTH

New Yorkers Defeated Barre-Montpelier 2 to 4, Saturday Afternoon, Closing Up the Game in the Last Two Trips.

Five hits off Wherry in the eighth and two bases on balls off Fraser, who was put into the box in the ninth when the game for Plattsburgh at the Inter-city park Saturday afternoon by a score of 8 to 4. The game was tied two to two at the beginning of the eighth inning, when Wherry weakened in his pitching and Plattsburg landed on him for two doubles and three singles, bringing in three runs.

The locals got in two rallies in the last half of this inning and with two down and a runner on third Fraser was put in to bat for Wherry but failed to bring in the runner as he flied out to right field. Fraser went into the box and after the first man up went out, he gave Alcott and Hartford bases on balls. Mathieu then flied out, making two down, but Dyer rapped out a two-bagger into right, scoring Alcott, and Sullivan followed with a single to center field, scoring both Hartford and Dyer. Pease got his base on a ground hit to Murphy, who threw wild to first. Rudolph ended it by going out on an assist by Fraser.

In the last half the locals had a good chance to even up the score, but ran into a double when Murphy attempted to steal second and was caught and O'Day was nipped in attempting to score from third on the throw. O'Day and Murphy had each singled and with no one down Harris came up and fouled out to the catcher and while Cotter was at bat the double ended the game.

The locals were the first to score, getting two tallies in the fourth. O'Day, opening with a two-bagger to left, went to third on Harris' fly to right, which was muffed, after Murphy had fouled out to the catcher. Cotter flied out to right and O'Day scored on the throw. Ball drew a base on balls and Clemens then singled, scoring Harris. Sanders went hit on a ground hit to Mathieu.

EDDY FOLLOWER IS FOUND GUILTY.

Father Convicted of Withholding Medical Attendance From Child.

New York, July 1.—For failing to provide proper medical attendance for his 16-year-old child, who died from bronchial pneumonia after a Christian Scientist had prayed for her daily, Clarence W. Byrne, was declared guilty by the judge of special sessions court Saturday. The offense is punishable by imprisonment for one year or a fine of \$500, or both.

Dr. Weston, coroner's physician, who made the autopsy, and Dr. Chester, chief of attendance made by Byrne at the inquest, when he admitted he called in no physician, but that Frank Roberts, second reader in the Second church of Christ, had given the "absent treatment" for the girl and had called on her the day of her death and had prayed over her.

JAMES BASSETT DEAD.

Pioneer of Goldfield Dies in Bennington at 82, a Victim of Paralysis.

Bennington, July 1.—James Bassett, one of the oldest residents of the village, died Saturday afternoon after a short illness from paralysis, which he sustained Thursday morning and from which he never regained consciousness. He was 82 years of age, had been in the best of health all winter and was seen on the streets every day.

BAR HARBOR EXPRESS TRAIN IS WRECKED

Mail Car, With Six Clerks Imprisoned Inside, Rolls Over and Down Embankment.

Waterville, Me., July 1.—Five trainmen and one passenger were injured Saturday afternoon, but no one was killed, in the wreck of train No. 29, known as the Bar Harbor express, on the Maine Central railroad, which leaves Portland at 11:05 a. m., and arrives here at 1:30 p. m. The wreck happened about half way between this city and Oakland.

The main and baggage cars, two Pullmans, a dining car and four day coaches were considerably damaged.

The train, which runs express from Portland to this city, was about 15 minutes late and was rolling along at a good rate when the tender jumped the track, evidently because of an accident to some part of the mechanism, and the other cars followed.

Fortunately the train was passing through a deep cut and the grassy bank saved the cars from being smashed to pieces and many people from being seriously injured or killed.

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PINKERTON AGENCY WAYS

A Former Employee Testifies

at Haywood Trial

DISCREDITING ORCHARD

Witnesses Declare That He Was 18 Miles Away From a Spot Which He Claims to Have Been In.

Boise, Idaho, July 1.—Morris Friedman, an employe of the Pinkerton detective agency at Denver, who published his adventures and many of the confidential reports and records that passed through his hands in an attack on the agency, was a witness Saturday in behalf of William D. Haywood, charged with the murder of former governor Steunenberg. Friedman told how the Pinkertons had sent spies into many of the important unions of the western federation of miners. Friedman has a shock of black hair and is of marked Hebrew type. Heavy thick glasses magnify his dark eyes. By name and operating number he identified the detectives who succeeded in entering or getting close to miners' unions in Colorado. He produced voluminous copies of the reports they made to that agency for transmission to the mine owners. Friedman was a confidential stenographer under Detective McPharland, and, so he testified, it was part of his duty to recopy the reports of the operators as they reached the office.

Friedman swore that in several instances the detectives sent out by the agency in behalf of the mine owners got elected to high offices in the unions, and in a couple of instances they carried their daring parts to the extent of sharing all the hardships of real strikers and being finally deported from the country with real strikers. Ten feet from Friedman's chair sat George W. Redell, who was a Pinkerton detective worked up a leadership in the Telluride union. Turning to him, by direction of Clarence Darrow, the witness identified Redell, who smiled and touched his chest as Friedman pointed toward him. Friedman said that one Pinkerton detective became chairman of the union strike relief committee at Globeville and as such had charge of all the funds and foods distributed by the local union and general federation. Friedman said that, under instructions from his superiors at the Pinkerton agency, this man first tried to beggar the federation by lavish expenditure in behalf of the strikers, and, failing in this, he cut the relief down to the lowest point of stinginess. In the hope that the members of the union might censure Haywood.
