THE BLIND OF CAIRO.

To Be Found Everywhere in the Shops and on the Streets. The first thing that impresses the stranger in Cairo is the number of blind-men, women and children—to be found everywhere in the shops and on the streets. Ophthalmia is very prevalent throughout Egypt. Because of superstition concerning "the evil eye" the native mothers of the middle or the lower class do not wash the eyes of their babies at all. Watching the flies buzzing unheeded around and upon these blind children, a stranger hastens to buy a fly whisk. These are for sale everywhere and are quite attractive with their ornaments of fancy beads and palm leaf fiber. Blind beggars crowd one at every corner. Even in the high class Egyptian families there are many blind. The lower classes of Egyptians are given much to hashish—that is, the lower classes in the large cities—and although it is against the law to sell it, one will have the hashish places pointed out, and the men who smoke the drug are seen everywhere. They are distinguished by the peculiar appearance of their eyes, which become red, swollen and baggy underneath, and by the peculiar color of the skin, which resembles somewhat the skin of a Chinese opium smoker.—Harriet Quimby in Leslie's Weekly.


The Bride Wins.

DEATH OF ABNER SMITH. Young Lawyer of East Concord Member of St. Johnsbury Firm.
