JAPANESE JOTTINGS.

Japan's six sardine factories are to be increased to thirty during 1907. Japan's exports of porcelain ware to the United States are increasing rapidly. They were about \$2,800,000 worth in 1906 against \$1,900,000 worth in 1905 and three and one-half times as much as in 1902.

The Kawasaki Dockyard company of Japan has increased its capital from \$3,000,000 to \$5,000,000 to engage also in the construction of locomotives, railway carriages, cast steel work, firearms, steel and dynamo. The capital is to be further increased to \$10,000,000.

Pensions For Workers.

About forty employees of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad have been retired on pensions. The men so retired have been in the employ of the company from thirty-five to forty years and will now receive from \$6 to \$7 a week for the remainder of their lives.

NOT FOR VICE PRESIDENT

Hughes Would Not Accept the Nomination

RELIABLE AUTHORITY

Claimed for This Announcement—He Might Be Willing to Run for Presidency—Victory in New York State Much Desired.

Albany, N. Y., July 10.—It is stated here today on incontrovertible authority that under no circumstances will Gov. Hughes be a party to any political combination that has for part of its plan his nomination for vice-president.

With equal authority it can be said that Gov. Hughes is in no sense of the word a seeker after public office. The only two offices for which he ever has been mentioned—those of mayor of New York city and governor of New York state—have sought him. The nomination for governor he accepted as a matter of public duty.

The understanding of Gov. Hughes is that there is one office no one has the right to decline any more than any one has a right to seek it, and that is the presidency. It is a foregone conclusion that if between now and the next national convention there should be a real call for him Gov. Hughes would again be ready to place himself at the disposal of his party.

Many of the cities on the Rhine have forbidden the wearing of masks on the streets during carnival time.


Peat is used in Germany for bedding, fodder, filter, fuel and packing purposes, and the consumption of it is increasing every year.
