Rutland Couldn't Get By Him or Over Him

WAS THEREFORE SHUT OUT

Twins Batted Both Donovan and Burns Hard and Won Game as They Pleased by the Score of 4 to 0 Before Fair Audience.

Eddie Laughlin's bunch of comers from the Marble City ran up against a stone wall at the Intercity park yesterday afternoon and all the six safe batters they got at the ball only rolled out nine goose eggs while the Hyphens had four earned tallies when the battle was over. Pitcher Wherry was the stone wall that they had to face and try as they would the marble cutters couldn't batter him over and he handed out to them the cleanest shut-out that has been seen at the park this summer.

It took two Rutland pitchers to hold the locals down to their four runs. Jerry Donovan started in to do the twirling but two singles and a double off him in the first inning for one run dashed his hopes and when in the second inning with two men on bases he passed the third one, Capt. Eddie got nervous and sent him to the bench. Burns succeeded him and succeeded in pulling out of the hole without the locals scoring. The locals earned one run off him in the fourth and two more in the eighth through timely bingles.

It was a fast clean game, only one misplay being made, that by A. Sullivan of Rutland, who muffed a grounder in the second inning. Rutland saw the third sack but three times in the game. In the first inning Laughlin started the game with a three-bagger to the right field fence but he stayed there only a very short time before Ball caught him napping and had him out on a pretty throw to Harris. Mahan and A. Sullivan each got a single in the sixth and were on second and third when the third out was made on strikes. In the ninth Collision singled to center, stole second and went to third on a put out at first which was the second out. But the best H. Sullivan could do was a fly into left which landed safely in Cotter's glove and the game was ended.

Clemons started the first inning for the locals with a single, was sacrificed to second by Harris and scored on Cotter's long drive to left that gave him two bases. Murphy then rapped the ball between short and third but it bounded and hit Cotter who was running to third, putting him out. Murphy was caught attempting to steal second, ending the inning.

STRAUS SAYS IMMIGRATION'S TIDE IS TURNING TO CANADA.

The Dominion to Supply Problems for Our Pacific Coast.
Seattle, Wash., July 19.—Oscar S. Straus, secretary of commerce and labor, declared that the tide of immigration is changing, particularly from the Oriental countries, and is turning toward Canada.

PRINCE ANNULS HIS YANKEE MARRIAGE

Son of Prince de Broglie Will Remarry Estelle Alexander Legally, It Is Said.

Paris, July 19.—The marriage of Prince Amande de Broglie's son, Robert to Miss Estelle Alexander of Chicago, which took place in August, 1904, was annulled by the court yesterday because it had been performed in secret.

The annulment of the Broglie marriage was granted upon the application of the prince. It is said now that the couple will remarry, fulfilling the necessary legal forms.
The Prince and Princess de Broglie are well known in New York, the princess having sung at the Colonial theatre last year.
They were to appear in Paris, but the clandestine character of their marriage influenced the prefect of police to forbid them because he feared scandal.

WANTS SWEDES TO RETURN.

Oscar Begins Investigation of Emigration.
Chicago, July 19.—King Oscar is anxious to secure the return to Sweden of the hundreds of thousands of Swedes who have emigrated to America, and has begun an investigation to determine what were the conditions which prompted the people to leave the fatherland and what would be necessary for Sweden to do to induce them to return.

ACTS ON SIBERIAN RAILWAY.

Project For Its Double Tracking Approved.
St. Petersburg, July 19.—The Council of Ministers has definitely approved the project for double tracking the Siberian railway, and a bill sanctioning this project will be submitted to the next Duma. An imperial ukase has been issued ordering the extension of a state of "re-enforced protection" in St. Petersburg for six months, beginning July 21.

WILL NOT ARBITRATE NEWFOUNDLAND CASE.

Foreign Secretary Sir Edward Grey Refuses to Discuss It.
London, July 19.—When asked in the House of Commons today if it was intended to submit the Newfoundland fisheries question to arbitration, Foreign Secretary Sir Edward Grey declined to give any information on the present state of negotiations.
Arrangements for next season, he said, were now under discussion by the governments concerned.



MOTHER SHOT BY HER BOY, MAY DIE

Youngster Started to Give Up Revolver When He Pulled the Trigger.

Moncton, N. B., July 19.—Word was received here today that Mrs. Sanford Anderson of Hillsboro was accidentally shot and perhaps fatally wounded by her 5-year-old son yesterday.

She left a room where a loaded revolver was lying on her desk, and on returning she saw the child with the weapon in his hands. She cried out for him to give her the revolver, and as he started to obey he pulled the trigger.

The bullet took effect in Mrs. Anderson's abdomen and the physicians say that she may die.

HAU MAKES ADMISION.

Confesses Writing Important Despatch.
Karlsruhe, Germany, July 19.—The trial of Karl Hau, on the charge of having murdered his mother-in-law, Frau Molitor, in Baden-Baden, on Nov. 6 of last year, was resumed here today. Hau surprised the court by making important admissions. When the presiding judge called handwriting experts to identify Hau's writing in the despatch sent from Paris calling Frau Molitor to that city, Hau anticipating the testimony, arose from his seat and said that in order to expedite the case he would admit that he wrote the despatch. The judge inquired whether he had sent it off, but this Hau declined to answer.

PRISON FOR MANILA CASHIER.

He is Sentenced For Falsifying Notes.
Manila, July 19.—P. O. Milford, former cashier of the defunct American bank of Manila, was today sentenced to imprisonment for eight years and ten months on conviction of having falsified notes purporting to be part of the assets of the bank.

HAYWOOD CASE IS OVER

Except For the Arguments, Which Begin To-day

NO WITNESSES YESTERDAY

The Case May Go to the Jury By Next Wednesday. Some of the Evidence Presented is Rejected.

Boise, Idaho, July 19.—The defense in the Haywood case rested immediately after court opened yesterday morning and without calling a single witness in rebuttal. Judge Wood announced that the opening argument for the state to the jury would be made this morning by Attorney James H. Hawley.

The jury was not brought into court yesterday, the day being given over to the consideration of instructions to be given the twelve men who have the life of the defendant in their hands. On this subject Judge Wood heard the views of opposing counsel.

The jury came back today when Attorney Hawley will open the first argument for the state. He will probably talk all day. Attorney Richardson will speak for the defense, then Clarence Darrow. The state will finish with Borah.

NEW YORK SWELTERING.
