Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges.

Elwin I. Bartlett, a graduate of Clark University, Worcester, Mass., has been engaged as principal of the Wallingford high school.

Sixteen churches met at East Wallingford Thursday in a basket missionary conference. Two Boston speakers were present.

Miss Jennie Cunningham, employed in a St. Johnsbury laundry, met a painful accident when one of her arms was drawn between the rollers of a machine. The arm and hand were badly crushed.

Mrs. Grace Spaulding, of West Rutland, is in a critical condition from hemorrhage which began July 9. All efforts of the doctors to stop the spasms have failed. She has become very weak from the strain and suffers terribly.

All Malletville, a village in Medina county, Ohio, turned out Tuesday, July 16, to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the elder inhabitant, Mrs. Mary Powers Goodrich. Bells were rung and fireworks exploded in the morning and later addresses were made by leading citizens. Mrs. Goodrich was born in Pittsford, near Rutland, July 16, 1807. At the age of 89 years she rode a bicycle and was active up to a few years ago.

The mausoleum which ex-Gov. John C. McCullough has erected in the old cemetery at Bennington Center has just been completed and is one of the largest, most expensive, and imposing of any similar structures in Vermont. The mausoleum stands on a large lot containing at least one-third of an acre, the lot being a part of the home grounds of Col. Ethan Allen of Revolutionary fame. The structure is of Barre granite and its dimensions are eighteen by twenty-six feet on the foundation and twenty-two feet high.

Probably Killed to Death by Horse. A fatal accident occurred near Danbury's crossing in Concord July 9 when Louis King was kicked to death by his horse. Mr. King resided with his parents and several brothers on a farm at Miles' pond, and for several years has run a meat cart into the neighboring villages and it was while on one of these trips that the accident occurred. The real facts of the case can never be known as no one witnessed it. The horse with a badly broken harness and in a very nervous, excited state, ran to a farm near-by, and upon investigation Mr. King was found lying dead across the road, with the blood oozing from a bad wound in the head. Imprints of the horse's hooves were found on the man's head and the skull was badly crushed.

CHURCH AND CLERGY.
