



FATHER-IN-LAW WINS CASE.

The Son-in-Law Loses Set-off Suit for Board.

Battleboro, Aug. 22.—The decision of C. C. Fitts, F. B. Pier and E. P. Adams, arbitrators in three law suits between George C. Ware of Brookline and his father-in-law, James C. Church of Townsend, was announced yesterday. Mr. Church is 87 years old. He went to live with his son-in-law when he was 70 years old and was with him 16 years. He loaned Ware \$600 and took a promissory note. Then he loaned him \$1,200 and took a mortgage on the farm. Recently Ware sued Church for \$2,500 on account of board. His father-in-law retaliated by foreclosing his mortgage and suing to recover on the promissory note. The board finds that Church was "a vigorous old man" when he went to live with Ware and that until within a few years his work offset the board account. Instead of allowing Ware anything, they find for Church to recover \$1,305.01.
