



CLEAR UP THE MYSTERY.

Young Soldier Was Reprimanded—Grew Despondent—Letters Too Late.

Rutland, Aug. 23.—The mystery as to the cause of the suicide of Recruiting Officer James McClain, U. S. A., who took carbolic acid here Tuesday night, was partially cleared up yesterday by Lieut. T. E. Ryan, his commanding officer, who arrived here early this morning. Young McClain had violated some army regulations and was asked for an explanation. He immediately wrote to the lieutenant and was informed that his explanation was satisfactory but McClain's letters indicated that he was becoming discouraged and he wanted to purchase his discharge.

He wrote his father in Pennsylvania for \$25 to assist in buying his release. The father sent the money to Lieut. Ryan. A note from the elder McClain telling of the sending of the money and one from the lieutenant acknowledging it, were found in the recruiting office yesterday. They arrived 24 hours too late.

The lieutenant says that McClain was an excellent soldier. He had served nine months of his second enlistment when he ended his life.
