sweat shops for the reason that they become broken down before they reach that age and are then to be found doing the house work while their wives and children toil their lives out in the shops.

The speaker vehemently denounced child labor, "saying God save a country that will permit the sacrificing of young lives to swell the profits of a few individuals who live in palaces." Is it right for a man to mind, body and soul of a person originally as intelligent as himself?

He claimed that the value of the union label could not be too much emphasized. The spread of consumption is in a large part due to consumptive men and women in the sweat shops breathing the germs into the garments that are sent broadcast over the land to be worn. The union label on a garment signifies that it has not been made in these germ breeding shops. In closing he urged all union men to be loyal, whole hearted and faithful to the principals of unionism.

SPORTS IN MORNING AT INTERCITY PARK

Two Interesting Games of Football, and Also Several Races Held the Attention of the Crowd.

Although the weather was anything but pleasant, about five hundred people gathered at Intercity park yesterday to witness the games and sports which had been planned as a Labor day celebration, and a majority of the events scheduled were pulled off. The first on the programme was given an exhibition five-a-side association football game between teams from the Rangers' club. The game was interesting and ended in a tie score at the end of the first half. In the second half the Blues took a spurt and the game finished with four tallies for them and one for the Yellows.

The next event was the 100-yard dash with the winners as follows: Henry Carbo, Montpelier, 1st; George Williamson, Barre, 2d; Albert Milne, Barre, 3d. Time, 12 seconds. The next was the five-a-side football match for the championship of the state, between the Bon-accords, Rangers and Northfield teams, and these events excited the most interest of any during the day. The first game was played between the Northfield and Bon-accord teams, and resulted in a 4 to 0 score in favor of the Bons. Anderson scored the first goal for the Bon-accords after the ball had been in play for about four minutes, and was successful in scoring again just before the half-time whistle blew. The second half was a repetition of the first, and the Bon-accords scored twice, while their opponents were unable to approach the goal. The scores in the second period were made by Brammer and A. Freeland. The players on the Northfield team were G. Fairs, goal; G. Spence, back; Albert Milne, Alex. Milne and G. Williamson, forwards. On the Bon-accord team the players were, J. Freeland, goal; Brammer, back; Anderson, Monroe and A. Freeland, forwards.

The second game was between the Bon-accords and the Rangers, and again the Bon-accords were successful in whitewashing their opponents. The game, which consisted of two seven and one-half minute periods, was played with considerable snap from the first, but the Bons were too strong for their opponents. In the first half Anderson and Brammer kicked goals, and in the second Anderson kicked two. The line-up of the Bon-accords was the same as in the first game, and that of the Rangers as follows: Haselmar, goal; Dunne, back; Laing, Johnson and Duguid, forwards. Joseph Will acted as referee.

The last on the programme as given was an exhibition of bag punching by Jack Kerr of Barre, champion bag puncher of Vermont, whose exhibition was received with the heartiest applause. It was then announced that a ball game would be played at three o'clock between teams from Barre and Montpelier, but the Barre team failed to appear, and the game was called off. The management states that a game had been arranged between the Crescents and the Montpelier team, but the manager of the Crescent team cancelled the game yesterday, and they were unable to get another team to play. The judges of the events were Alex. Cruickshank, George Biddell, A. L. Carr and A. M. Smith, while Pat McCarthy acted as announcer.

The girl's race was won by Alice Holland, but the names of the other two prize-winners are not known. 
