MONTPELIER

Thomas Corvin, aged nearly 58 years, died at his home on Main street at 6 o'clock last evening after an illness of three months with kidney trouble. He was taken ill on the eighth day of June and has been confined to the bed most of the time since.

Dillingham, who arrived in New York last week after a several months' trip in Europe with the sub-committee which has been looking into the immigration question across the seas, arrived in this city on Sunday morning. He is in excellent health and reports an exceedingly interesting trip. He sailed May 15 and sailed from Liverpool on his return August 29.

She displayed great fortitude, however, getting into the carriage and being driven home, where the injury was attended to by Dr. Davenport. Beyond being bruised Mr. Denny was unhurt.

Architect G. G. Adams of Lawrence, Mass., sent word that he would be here Wednesday. A meeting of the city hall committee will be held at that time. The committee expects that the plans and specifications will be ready for action at this meeting, and in all probability the committee will be in a position to ask for bids as soon as some details are arranged. While the committee has no positive information that Mr. Adams will have the plans with him, still they look for them, and if they come will make no delay in getting down to business and asking for bids on the new city hall. Members of the committee are still in hopes of having the foundation laid this fall.

The sheriff department conducted two unsuccessful raids Saturday afternoon and evening, on warrants issued by the state's attorney. About 4 p. m., Sheriff Tracy and Lawson visited George Lumbrey's place on East State street, but they found nothing. In the evening Sheriff H. C. Lawson, John Hannan and Hiram Wedge drove to West Berlin and raided a double tenement house near the store occupied by two Italian families usually, but Saturday evening only one family was at home and the officers found no liquor in the tenement they searched. They got back here about 1 p. m. The houses visited at West Berlin were occupied by Messrs. Pedeski and Bertoli.

RUMORS ALARMED FRIENDS.

Charles W. Fisk, New York Banker, Reoperating at Woodstock Inn. Woodstock, Sept. 10.—Charles W. Fisk, a member of the New York banking firm of Harvey Fisk & Sons, has been staying with his family since Thursday at the Woodstock Inn, suffering, it is said, from a nervous breakdown, but his condition showed a decided improvement yesterday. Mr. Fisk, it is understood, came here from the Adirondacks where he went recently from Montreal on account of his health. He is under the care of Dr. O. W. Sherwin. When the latter visited Mr. Fisk yesterday morning, he found him sitting up and Mr. Fisk said he felt better than he had for some time. Dr. Sherwin states there is nothing in Mr. Fisk's condition to arouse anxiety. Reports that he was seriously ill have brought numerous inquiries from his friends in New York city.


