Items of Interest Gleaned From Our Exchanges.

George H. Wilder, who has been undergoing treatment at the state hospital for the insane at Waterbury, expects to open the Wilder studio at Burlington October 1.

Samuel Carpenter of Wilmington is in a serious condition from injuries received in a collision with a four-horse team. One of the heavy wheels passed over his body, crushing the ribs on his left side and nearly severing one ear. Internal injuries were also probably sustained.

Interference in a fight between the family cat and a stray dog caused Mrs. C. E. Greene of West Derby to receive severe injuries. The cat was about to spring at the dog when Mrs. Greene stepped in. The dog was torn open to the bone by the infuriated animal.

A group of men seated on the piazza of the Marble Valley club in West Rutland were startled when a whizzing bullet passed close by them and buried itself in the window casing. It came from the Italian quarter and was of 32 calibre. Game Warden Bliss took the matter up but did not succeed in locating the man who fired it.

The superintendent of the Snowflake Canning factory in Brattleboro expects to handle about 50,000 bushels of corn this season. It is at first expected that the factory could not be profitably operated this season but crops are turning out better than anticipated and the prospect is that the force of 135 men will be employed until the middle of October.

Six hundred acres of free land and 70,000 acres of timber limits, mills, stores, ten houses, steam tugs, horses, lumbering camps, barges, booms and wharves to the value of \$60,000, some miles from Quebec on the St. Lawrence have been purchased by a group of men including John Hatch and Alexander Cochrane of Groton and C. L. Soule of Northfield. The timber is said to be of old growth and to contain some 600,000,000 feet of pine and spruce. Cutting will commence at once.
