The driver drew his horses to the benches when he felt the front axle of the wagon break and shudderingly awaited the explosion as he heard the horses topple to the ground.


The crowd scattered when he feebly warned them of the contents of the boxes and explained that he did not understand why that section of the town had not been destroyed.

DESERTED INFANT, THE FIRST CASE UNDER NEW LAW

Mr. and Mrs. John B. Chandler of Manchester, N. H., Accused—Offense is Punishable by Imprisonment.

Manchester, N. H., Oct. 2.—Charged with abandoning their seven-month-old child, a crime that under the new law passed by the last legislature is punishable by imprisonment in state's prison, Mr. and Mrs. John B. Chandler, 40 Union street, was arrested today and held without bail.

When the child was left on the doorstep of E. G. Fletcher, a prominent resident of the city, and was sent to the county farm.

The grandmother of the child was dissatisfied with the explanation of the parents as to where it had gone and went to the county farm, and it is said, identified the infant.

HUNDREDS FIGHT. HEMMED BY FLAME. A Woman Pushed Off Fire Escape to the Pavement—Incendiary Menaces 30 Families.

New York, Oct. 2.—One woman was seriously injured and the lives of several hundred other persons endangered by a fire which early today burned out the three upper floors of a six-story tenement house on East Third street.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 2.—Topagin, the revolutionist, who on Sept. 21 was for the third time sentenced to death by court-martial for participation in a series of robberies and other crimes, committed, he claimed, as an agent of the secret police, was executed at Moscow yesterday.

THINKS FERNALD AND 'MATHER' ONE. Postal Authorities Believe Man Indicted in "Frauds" Fled to London.

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 2.—James B. Cortelyou, chief of the postal inspectors, gives it as his opinion that Henry Mather, the London "banker" who seduced bankers and brokers, is none other than Walter G. Fernald, indicted as one of the heads of the Imperial Trustee company of New Jersey, held by the department to be one of the most gigantic swindlers ever uncovered by the postal inspectors.

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CORTELYOU STIRS TAFT MEN

Secretary's Manager Complained to Roosevelt OF OPPOSITION ACTIVITY

Rival Agents Keeping Busy—President's Attitude Toward Taft Worrying Supporters of the War Department's Head.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 2.—While the "secretary of peace," Mr. Taft, journeys at Tokio his followers are making warfare upon his cabinet colleague, Secretary Cortelyou. That much is assured from the tone of Ohio dispatches published here yesterday morning.

These developments, including President Roosevelt's conference Monday with Secretary Taft's manager, State Insurance Commissioner Verry, do not surprise Washington. Secretary Cortelyou has been reaching out after the southern delegates for months, and some of the most powerful Republican leaders have been helping him.

Recently Secretary Cortelyou recommended a certain action in another department. He had been told it would help him to delegates in a big southern state.

STOP ON RAILROAD BUILDING, SAYS SANTA FE CHIEF. Ripley Agrees With Hill as to Outlook for New Construction, Owing to Present Attitude of the Public.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 2.—The suggestion that railroad building must stop in the United States, made by James J. Hill of the Great Northern, found a kindred sentiment yesterday in E. P. Ripley, president of the Santa Fe, who said: "I think there will not be much more railroad building in this country so long as the attitude of the public remains as it is today."

SCIENTISTS JOIN BELL TO BUILD HIS AIRSHIP. Lieutenant Selfridge Among Experts Who Organize Society—Inventor Expects to Have Flying Machine.

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 2.—At a dinner given by Dr. Alexander Graham Bell here, the Aerial Experiment society was formed to carry on the work which Prof. Bell has been conducting for several years.

IS TRYING TO PAWN JEWELS OF SULTAN. Moroccan Minister Is Busy Raising Money to Pay War Indemnity.

Paris, Oct. 2.—The powers signatory of the Algiers convention, with the exception of Spain, have agreed to the measures formulated by France with the view of preventing the introduction of contraband into Morocco. The measure will be placed in operation.

STEEL MEN LAID OFF. Homestead Mills Discharge 100 Skilled Workers.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Oct. 2.—The United States Steel corporation has laid off 100 pattern makers at the Homestead Mills of the Carnegie Steel company. This is the first instance, as far as known, of the laying off of skilled workmen by this corporation.

POPULACE CAUSED FIRE. Chinese Angered at the Rice Tax, Set Winchow Afire.

Hongkong, Oct. 2.—The big fire at Wuchow last Friday, which destroyed hundreds of natives' houses and a large number of boats was due to the rage of the populace over the rice tax, to which there is fierce opposition. The loss by the fire amounted to \$1,000,000. The Europeans at Wuchow are safe.
