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OHIO'S CRACK GUN
CRACKED BY SHOT.

Experts Called to Inspect Big Cannon Which Made World's Record.

New York, Oct. 9.—The allotted time of 30 days for repairs to the battleship Ohio may have to extend because of the discovery of a crack in the powder chamber of one of her 12-inch rifles. This defect appeared just after she shipped out, finished her practice in Cape Cod bay, and was sufficiently serious to prevent the gun from firing in the battle practice.

While ordnance experts are not positive that the fissure was caused by the great pressure in the powder chamber when last fired, and, in fact, while several of them are not positive that the crack goes any depth in the tube, yet the defect is serious enough to make it necessary for a board of experts from the gun factory in Washington to come on to the navy yard to examine it.

When the Ohio was flagship to the late Rear Admiral C. J. Train, U. S. N., on the Asiatic station, the gun made the world's record of three hits a minute at 1,000 yards with the ship steaming 10 knots.
