SUNDAY SCHOOL GROWTH.

Encouraging Figures Given at The State Convention in Manchester.

Manchester, Oct. 10.—The second day of the 39th annual convention of the Vermont State Sunday school association began at nine o'clock yesterday morning in the Congregational church.

The meetings are presided over by Hon. N. G. Williams of Bellows Falls, president of the association. Among noted speakers and Sunday school workers in attendance are Mr. Alfred Day, general superintendent of the New York state association, Mr. W. K. Ansell, superintendent of the Ruggles Street Baptist Sunday school in Boston, Mrs. Mary Foster Bryner of Leoria, Ill., and Mr. E. C. Knapp of Hartford, Conn.

At the forenoon session the Rev. S. J. Barton of Greensboro gave the report of the teacher training superintendent after which diploma were conferred on graduates for 1907 as follows: Advance course, Alice E. Bacon, Bradford; international first course, Mary F. Farnham, Nellie A. Wilson, Sadie H. Doe, Mabel Worthy of Bradford; Vermont first course, Carrie H. McNeil, Ethel Byington, Mrs. C. O. Barney, Caro E. Carpenter, Anna Byington, Mrs. Ralph Smith, Hervey Guilek of Charlotte.

An annual association of 12 members was formed.

The report of General Secretary Fuller showed a remarkable increase in Sunday school attendance. He reported 643 schools in the state with an enrollment of 4,560, making a gain of 398 for the year; cradle roll membership 4,411, a gain of 595; home department membership 9,103, a gain of 1,802; total enrollment in all departments, 60,183. He also reported gains of 224 in the number of men between 18 and 44 and 1,918 of children between five and 18 years of age over last year.

At the banquet held in the church parlor last evening covers were laid for 300 people.
